ABOARD U. S. S. SEATTLE, AT SEA IN HAWAIIAN WATERS, May 26.—Words of cheer have been sent to the 100 prisoners on the lonely leper isle of Molokai and a portion of the United States fleet will steam within sight of the colony which so rarely gets a glimpse of the outside world.

Admiral Robert E. Coontz, commander in chief of the navy Monday granted the request of the island lepers and it was announced that seven light cru-

ers would be dispatched to parade before Molokai.

A navy seaplane recently made a landing near the leper settlement and scores left sick beds and dragged their scarred bodies to see for the first time that which to them was a miracle—a machine which flew.
