Democratic National Committee Head To Resign Is Report

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Reports that Clem L. Shaver is to resign as chairman of the democratic national committee within two weeks, developed in political quarters here today.

Democratic politicians who have been impatient to begin political activity again, have been urging for some time that Shaver step aside and permit a fresh man to take charge.

This pressure has increased since the announcement that Chairman William M. Butler of the republican national committee was planning intensive organization for the congressional elections.

FIGHT AGAINST RUM RUNNERS IS NOW ON BORDER

Having driven the rum fleet from rum row, Uncle Sam is now tightening up his northern border to prevent liquor smuggling across the Great Lakes and the Canadian frontier.

This new drive is in effect from coast to coast, but particular attention is being paid to the Great Lakes district where huge quantities of liquor have been smuggled since the prohibition laws were enacted. This activity of federal officers, according to prohibition Commissioner Roy A. Haynes, is also designed to meet the increased operations of the rum runners, which have been noted since the inward flow was dried up on the Atlantic coast. Haynes, who claims that the bootleggers "are on the run" everywhere and says that with less liquor coming in from the coasts "it is now possible for the federal forces to concentrate on international problems such as large conspiracies which have developed for distributing liquor from various sources into devious channels."

High federal officials are now conferring at Buffalo on a policy which will effect an armed blockade from Lake Erie to the Oswego shore line and predicts that by the end of July they will "have this border corked up so tightly that not even a bottle of ale will pass the river." Meanwhile the most extensive activities are being carried on in the Detroit sector.

DETROIT, May 26.—State troopers are vigorously co-operating with the federal officials and will aid the "dry navy" which expects effectively to blockade the 50 mile water front from Port Huron to Detroit. Several squads of these police have been patrolling strategic points in the area and motorcycle and automobile squads have just been added. Between 15 and 20 speed boats are expected to operate from a base somewhere in Lake Erie, but the drive will center and begin at Detroit under the com-

mand of James T. Breereton, veteran dry agent recently assigned to the "dry navy" here.

SUPREME COURT UPHOLDS MALHEUR WATER COMPANY

SALEM, May 26.—The right of directors of the Orchards Water company of Malheur county to levy assessments against water users and to withhold water in the enforcement of collections of such assessments was upheld by the supreme court in an opinion today.

SALEM, May 26.—A site of 18 and three-quarters acres bordering on the public highway in the southern part of the city of Ashland was selected by the board of regents of the normal school in session here Tuesday as the location of the new southern Oregon normal.

Strange Holdup Is Revealed In Gotham

NEW YORK, May 26.—The story of an alleged holdup in which Samuel A. Guiberson, a California millionaire, was forced by his friend, William K. Gough, to enter a Fifth avenue bank at the point of a gun and write a check for \$10,000, was told to a jury today.

Gough, a Kentuckian, who now lives in Cincinnati, denied the robbery charge, declaring that the money was given him in a business transaction.

The robbery, according to Guiberson, occurred on October 4, 1924. Gough and the millionaire had had breakfast together at the Biltmore. They left in a taxi. Suddenly, Guiberson said he felt a pistol against his side, and then Gough ordered him to drive to the Fifth avenue branch of the Guarantee Trust company.
