

WEST TRAMPLES ON EAST AS U. S. C. WINS IN FIELD

Southern Calif. School Is Winner Of Big East-West Track Classic; U. Of C. Fails To Show Strong

FRANKLIN FIELD, PHILADELPHIA, May 30.—The east divided, and the west triumphed.

Bronzed athletes, wearing the Trojan shield of the University of Southern California, won their first intercollegiate track and field championship on the sun-drenched cinders and greens of Franklin field this afternoon, scoring 33 points to 29 1/2 for Princeton, their nearest opponent.

Displaying great strength in the shot put, discus and in the hurdles, the U. S. C. stars pulled through to victory, while the eastern contenders fought between themselves for points in the other events, and thus made possible the Trojans' triumph.

Yale, favored to retain the title which the Elis wrested from the University of California at Cambridge last spring, just when it seemed that the Bears could not be beaten, finished third this year with 25 1/2 points, only slightly ahead of Georgetown, which had 23 and Pennsylvania with 22.

California, rated a dangerous contender, did not display the strength that was expected of its powerful squad and finished seventh. Cornell beat out the Bears with 16 1/2 points and Penn State followed the Californians' score of 12 1/2 with a total of 12. Harvard, thanks to victories in the mile and two mile runs, also scored 12 points.

Less than 10,000 spectators gathered in the big brick bowl at Franklin field in the sunny afternoon of Memorial Day to witness the games. There was no ceremony and no bands, as the Southern Californian victory was chalked up. After the middle of the contest the westerners' lead was a convincing one and it merely remained for Kenneth Grumble to tilt to victory over the low timbers to make U. S. C. certain of possession of the huge silver cup, which stood on display in the infield.

N. B. Sherill, of the University of Pennsylvania cleared 13 feet 2 inches in the pole vault, after winning the event and as his mark was not set in competition it does not stand as a record. Sherill is the first man in an intercollegiate meet to exceed Bob Gardner's 13-year record of 13 feet 1 inch.

Mystery still shrouds the reason why young Henry Russell, of Cornell, did not come out for the 100 yard dash, in which he had qualified. Rumor had it that his appearance in this event would have threatened the chances of another college which had a chance for the title, but such things are for the confines of the training quarters and not for the records.

Wilbur Harrington has a hard nut to crack this time in Jack McCarthy, who has a world of experience in the boxing game in many parts of the globe, as he was a fighter in the navy.

Babe Lightfoot is another boy who will get an acid test when he meets Richard Scott, of Chico.

There will be a 4 round curtain raiser.

Ben Dixon, who refereed the last card, will referee again this time.
