

Duesenberg Special Breaks Indianapolis Speedway Record

DE PAOLO DRIVES HOME TO VICTORY IN 500 MILE AUTO DERBY, AVERAGING 101 MILES HOUR

Crowd Into Big Speedway For American Racing Historic Of The Year; Last Year's Record Made By Boyer Is Smashed

INDIANAPOLIS SPEEDWAY, Ind., May 30.—Breaking records for this mammoth bowl, Peter De Paolo is Duesenberg special to victory in the 13th annual automobile sweepstakes here today.

De Paolo's time was 4:56:39.47, an average of 101.13 miles an hour. The previous track record was 98.2 miles an hour last year by L. L. Corum and Joe Boyer, who piloted a Duesenberg.

Over 150,000 madly shouting motor enthusiasts witnessed the spectacle, according to estimates. The stands were of color, many thousand women making up the mammoth crowd, which was about twice the size of the crowd at the Kentucky derby.

De Paolo carried away a prize of \$20,000 by the terrific lead he set. Benny Hill and Dave Lewis, who took turns driving the second best car, will divide second money—according to the number of laps they drove. W. D. and Phil Shafer, who divided honors in driving the car, will split \$5,000 the same way.

The roar of the mightiest motors built on any continent, promptly at 10 a. m. They were paced on the first lap by Eddie Rickenbacker, formerly a speed devil himself. De Paolo jumped into the lead on the first lap and wasn't until the 174th, when he was forced to the pits. Come took up the mad chase, and in the last 100 miles to his own.

The last 50-mile stretch was the test. De Paolo was being followed by Hill, who had replaced Lewis in a junior special around and around they flew, motors roaring against the crowd. Hill did some gaining, but his spurt late—De Paolo flashed across the finish line an easy winner. Hill was credited with an average of 100.82 miles an hour.

OREGON U. AND O. A. C. MAKE POOR SHOWING IN PACIFIC CONFERENCE TRACK MEET; STANFORD WINNER

SEATTLE, May 30.—Smashing their way through the weight events, hurdles, jumps and relay, Stanford this afternoon won the annual Pacific coast conference track and field meet with 62½ points.

University of Washington was second with 46½ points. Between five and six thousand, the largest crowd ever assembled here for a track contest, saw the battle, in which Leistner, Stanford, and Sweet, Montana, were tied for individual scoring honors.

Numerous conference records were broken. Outstanding was the accomplishment of Hartranft, Stanford, who threw the shot put 11 inches short of the world's record. His mark was 50 feet 1.3 inches. A strong southwesterly wind retarded track times. The final score:

Stanford, 62½; Washington, 46½; Montana, 15½; O. A. C., 14; Oregon, 13; W. S. C. 8½; Idaho, 5; Whitman, 0.

Wilde, Washington, broke the conference mark for the mile with 4:24.5. Listner, Stanford, set a new conference mark of 15 seconds flat for the high hurdles.

Maginnis, Washington, the suprise of the day, won the two-mile event, with the new conference meet mark of 9:37.5.
