Baker Addresses

"We are met at this solemn hour to commemorate the gallant deeds and to do honor to the heroic dead of the United States navy. We have brought garlands of flowers to cast upon the waters as the highest expression of our tribute to these noble men. No grassy mound in quiet church yard, nor grayed stone marks their last resting place. They sleep in the deep, in a windowless palace of rest, 'neath wild, surging billow and quiet waters knowing neither sunshine or storm. They are gone to join and mingle with the multitudes of the countless dead and so swell the chorus of the choir invisible whose anthems bless and inspire the living, and whose silent influence is ever with us.

"And so today we honor the memory of all our sailors dead—let us never forget their hardships, their heroic sacrifices, their noble deaths. It is to them we owe, in large measure our present security, our national greatness and our world influence. May we ever cherish in our hearts their grand and glorious deeds until the end of time."

Parade Held

Senator Edward Miller, of Grants Pass, was the orator of the day and in his address he reviewed all the stirring war time achievements of this country in most effective style, with particular supplication to his hearers to resolve that "These honored dead shall not have died in vain," etc. The speaker emphasized Memorial Day as a day of real memory and emulation of our great leaders who have passed on. His reference to Abraham Lincoln, Garfield, and McKinley, the martyred presidents, Theodore Roosevelt, and Woodrow Wilson all brought forth sustained applause.

Diverting from the war time heroes and accounts of their deeds, the speaker made most effective reference to the accomplishment of our noble pioneers, both men and women, as a race of sturdy people

deserving no less honor than the most famous leaders of our wars.

With glowing words the speaker dwelt on America's ideals and stand for a government of the people, for the people, and by the people, which principles he said had actuated the nation's motives in every war in which we have been engaged. Senator Miller's talk was one which schooled his hearers in the cardinal rules of better citizenship.
