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OREGON U. PROF: TO BE SPEAKER AT GRADUATION

Largest Eighth Grade In K. F. History Graduates Friday Morning

Alfred Lomas, professor of foreign trade, of the University of Oregon faculty, has been chosen by Superin- tendent J. P. Wells of Klamath Falls public schools, to be the speaker of the eighth grade commencement ex- ercises, which will be held in the Pine Tree theatre, Friday morning, June 5. The exercises are sched- uled for 10:30 a. m.

Professor Lomas has chosen for his subject: "Service to Oregon Through Industry." The class of 114 students is the largest to have graduated from Klamath Falls grade schools, and of this number, according to J. P. Wells, 109 are planning to continue their education in high schools. Di- plomas will be awarded by Mr. Wells.
