

WORK FOR LOCAL SCOUTS OUTLINED

Meeting Of Scoutmasters And Committeemen On Tonight

Outlining the work for the coming summer, and organizing scout troops in the city, will occupy three weeks allotted to Cecil A. Cook, district scout executive, who arrived in Klamath Falls the early part of the week from his Medford headquarters.

According to Cook, he expects to organize three new troops in the city during his visit here. Two of the troops will be organized in the Presbyterian church, under the direction of Percy Murray and Frank Moser, who will serve as scoutmasters. The third troop is anticipated for Mills school, the scoutmaster to be selected this week.

A meeting of scoutmasters and troop committeemen has been called for 7 p. m. tonight in the chamber of commerce. A meeting on Monday night of the scout troop No. 1, called out more than 25 boys, interested in the work to be perfected during the summer.

Through the courtesy of the forest department, a portion of the southwestern section of Lake of the Woods has been allotted to the Crater Lake council of Boy Scouts. During the month of July, according to Cook, the troops from Klamath Falls will be allowed to spend four weeks at the camp, the boys privileged to stay any length of time during the month they wish.

According to Cook, an expert camp cook will be employed, and two of the University of Oregon physical education majors will be at the camp during the summer to serve as athletics instructors, life saving men, and have charge of all water activities.

The camp will accommodate 40 boys, for which number it is equipped. However in an emergency 60 boys can be cared for, according to Cook, who will be there during the entire month. A semi-permanent camp for the summer will be erected, army tents will be used for sleeping tents and a large canopy tent for the mess quarters.

Ramp system for scout rating will be worked out during the entire summer according to the scout executive and the boys will have unlimited opportunities to learn woodcraft, how to handle themselves in the water and other out-of-door activities. Hikes are planned to Mt. Pitt and probably to Crater Lake from Lake of the Woods.

Boys interested in the work of the scout master may take the earliest opportunity to become a member of the troop in which they are privileged to join in order to be included in the summer's outline.
