

Sammy Olsen Gets Popular Decision Over Clumsy Joe Gorman

OLSON LACKS PUNCHING ABILITY TO PUT SLEEPING TOUCH TO BIG BRUISER; SEMI-WINDUP IS GREAT

Topping one of the finest boxing cards ever staged in Klamath Falls, Sammy Olson and Jim (Firpo) Gorman pulled lugged and pushed each other around the ring for ten rounds, Olsen getting the verdict.

For the first four rounds, Gorman appeared drunk, and was on the floor from one to five times each round, not so much from punches, as from his inability to stand on his two feet. Olsen hit him with everything except the referee's shirt, but the big Swede's punches didn't seem to carry any authority. A good middleweight, with a punch heavy enough to dent a roll of cold storage butter would have turned the lights out for Gorman before the third round.

Opening the battle, Olsen shoved his left into Gorman's face so many times that "Firpo" imagined everyone in the house had a pair of boxing gloves on and were after him.

For four rounds, the Swede handed out plenty of punishment but Gorman assimilated it in regular Bat Nelson style, and although he parked his tonneau on the canvas several times, was always in there trying at the bell.

Gorman cut loose in the fifth, landing his first blow, but Sammy longranged him to death. In the seventh and eighth and ninth rounds Gorman weakened, and was close to a knockout at the end of the 9th, but came back strong in the tenth. There was no question as to the verdict.

Some Klamath Falls lumber camp lost a good lumberjack when Gorman put on the gloves, while a Galesburg, Illinois, farmer is still mourning the loss of a hay hand, who was lost when Olson took up the manly art.

Semi-Windup a Peach
Joe Coffman, Portland welter, handed Johnny Carlson of Spokane a neat lacing for six rounds and grabbed off a popular verdict. Coffman was too fast for the Spokane boy, and kept Carlson on the defensive most of the battle.

The first three rounds were fairly even, with Carlson landing the heaviest blows, but in the final rounds Coffman opened up, and had Carlson groggy in the fifth. Both finished strong, however, but Coffman had a clear lead.

Helme Meyers of Sacramento carried too many guns for Wilbur Harrington, local scrapper, and the local kid went out for keeps in the third round of a scheduled four-round tussle.

Meyers heard the birdies in the first round, when Harrington parked him right on the button, but the punch was not hard enough to keep the Sacramento kid on the floor. From the opening bell the boys cut loose with everything they had, and it was a cinch the way they started, the affair wouldn't go the four cantos.

Meyers went down for a seven-count early in the first, and was sent to the canvas for another short count at the close of the same round. He came back strong in the second and had a slight edge. In the third Meyers went down again in the first minute, but came back and battered Harrington all over the ring. After two minutes and twenty seconds of fighting, the local boy went down for good.

In the first preliminary, Babe Lightfoot, local lightweight, and Richard Scott of Chico, Calif., went four rounds to a draw. It looked as though Lightfoot had the decision coming, for he took the last three rounds, after getting off to a woody start.

Young Bursell Coleman, 70-pound Klamath Falls mauler, and Henry McFarland of Roseburg, 78-pounder, went four rounds to a draw in the curtain raiser. The kids showed plenty of class in the go, and were given a good shower of silver by the crowd.

BIG SHAKE-UP IN YANK LINEUP BRINGS VICTORY FOR 1ST TIME IN SIX GAMES; RUTH PLAYS AGAIN

Miller Huggins, manager of the New York Yanks, unsheathed the cruel cleaver yesterday afternoon, and laid it on the necks of three old-established fixtures in the personnel of the ex-champions. The new ball team, with Babe in the line-up to set a high example, charged the Washington Senators and won a game of ball for the first time in their last six encounters. The score was 8 to 5, and the defeat was a dear one for the Senators, who lost much ground to the Athletics.

Wally Pipp, who has been playing first base for the Yanks for seven or eight seasons, was withdrawn in favor of Lou Gehrig, a college player. Erin Ward, the regular second baseman, veteran of three world series campaigns, was relieved by Howard Shanks. Benny Bengough, the substitute catcher, took Wally Schang's place under the bat.

Wanniger, a rookie, continued at shortstop, where he replaced Deacon Scott, some weeks ago, and Earl Combs, last year's substitute, still held the outfield place that he won away from Whiter Witt. So the Yank lineup included five fellows who were comparative foreigners, in addition to the welcome stranger, Babe Ruth.

Between them, this force, including the Babe, made 19 hits and accounted for five of the Yanks' 8 runs. The Athletics beat the Red Sox in Boston, 15 to 2, and are now three full games in front of the Senators.

The White Sox lost another to the Tigers in Detroit, 16 to 15, but held third place. The Indians, however, subsided to fifth, and the Browns came up to first division, when the Browns beat the Cleveland club in Cleveland, 8 to 3. There was an explosion in the

National league. The Dodgers beat the Giants for the first time in their six encounters, 6 to 5, and red fire burned in the streets of Brooklyn, celebrating the event. The reserve lineup of the invalid Giants made three errors. There were 32 hits all told.

The Pirates were unable to keep pace with the Dodgers' advance, for they and the Cubs were idle. However the Pittsburgh team is still in third, not far from the Dodgers.

The Phillies were trounced by the Braves in Philadelphia 12 to 5, and

the Reds lost again to the Cards in St. Louis, 8 to 2.
