

NEWSOM MAKES STIRRING APPEAL TO KLAMATH FOR AID OF LEGION'S FIVE MILLION DOLLAR ENDOWMENT

Dr. G. S. Newsom, county health officer and a major in the medical corps of the U. S. army in the world war, delivered a stirring appeal to the members of the Klamath county chamber of commerce at the American Legion forum meeting yesterday, for the support of the nation-wide five million dollar endowment drive for taking care of orphans of soldiers and sailors of the great war who have died.

"The poppies have bloomed six times on the fields of Flanders since the great war closed," Major Newsom said "but still day in and day out, every time the sun goes down it marks a day in which an average of 16 ex-service men have answered the final taps. Those are figures compiled from insurance data, and it must be understood that many of these men who are passing leave families of absolutely dependent children. These men who are dying every day are just as great heroes as the ones who sleep under the little white crosses in the fields of northern France, and America owes them just as great a debt and just the same devotion as the men killed in action.

"The children of these men left

without a protector and in many cases penniless must be taken care of, Dr. Newsom said, and they must be given a fair chance to grow up and become good patriotic citizens as their fathers were before them, they must have instilled in their hearts a love for their country instead of hate, the natural outgrowth of neglect.

"It is the purpose of the legion endowment drive to provide funds for the care of these orphaned waifs," the speaker pointed out. In order that they may be cared for when these emergencies arise, and then in due time the dependents turned over to the fostering care of a well meaning but slow moving government agency dedicated to the care of these citizens of tomorrow."

The Legion fund, it was shown, is designed for this emergency relief and it would be of life and death importance daily in all parts of the land.

Following yesterday's meeting it was arranged with chamber of commerce officials to appoint a committee to assist the Legion in raising Klamath's quota of \$2,000 for this work. It was stated that the Rotary and Kiwanis clubs were also assisting in the same manner.

Edna Ferber's "So Big," and John Galsworthy's "White Monkey" are still popular, and among the most widely read books that leave the Klamath library. Among the new books that have found instant favor are E. M. Forster's "A Passage to India," and Wren's "Beau Geste."

In "A Passage to India," the Bookman has found "race contrasts in the Orient are described by a visionary and propagandist."

Of "Beau Geste" many comments have been made. The novel is based

on the plot of the foreign legion. Of it one critic says, "a mystic story whose chief interest is in its vivid description of life in the French Foreign Legion, which is full of color and spirit and evidently drawn from personal knowledge. The theft of a priceless sapphire involves

three brothers whose quixotic ideas of honor impel them to enlist in the Foreign Legion."

Among the new books placed on the shelves of the library June 1 were found "Father Abraham," Bachelier; "Cross Trails," Bindloes; "The Invisible Woman," Quick; "Red of the Redfields," Richmond; "Luck in Love," Rack; "His Official Pledge," Rack; "Count of Monte Cristo," set of Dumas, two volumes. Of these new books, all but the last are "rentals."

Another set of books recently put on the shelves includes: "Tales of the Old Times," Bechdolt; "Desert Brew," Bower; "Priceless Pearl," Miller; "The White Stone," Mitchell; "His Wife-in-Law," Oemler; "Walker of Secret Service," Post; "Beauty of the Purple," Davis; "Tiger Claws," Terhune; "Glory Hole," White; "Mammy's White Folks," Sampson; "Professor, How Could You?" Wilson; "Terrific Mystery," Lowndes. These are also rental books.

levy for county general purposes is \$156,169, for cities and towns, \$126,836, for county library, \$2,467, drainage districts, \$31,765, irrigation districts, \$146,554, and fire patrol, \$4,511. Klamath county's share of the tax levied for state administration purposes is \$15,675, or 1.49% of the county total, and for the soldiers' bonus, \$21,176.
