His mother, Mrs. Mary Copley Thaw, who has spent more than \$2,000,000 to keep him out of prison, is taking steps to end the "spree." Meanwhile, Evelyn Nesbit, Thaw's divorced wife, is in Chicago, fearsome that Harry will injure her.

Through the efforts of Marlon Nine, president and general manager of the Shasta View Lumber & Box company, all employees of the company are offered an insurance under group insurance with all benefits returned to the policy holder. Common labor may be insured up to an amount of 1,000 with the policy owner paying 60c and the company the balance on the sum due. Heads of departments and office employees are allowed insurance up to the sum of \$3,000 with the same privilege allowed them. The policies are held with the Aetna Insurance company. The efforts of Mr. Nine, who had the interest of the employees at heart on the subject for some time, were brought to head on Friday afternoon and more than 50 employees of the company took immediate advantage of the offer. The policies are transferable so that in case of death the money will be turned over to the person designated on the policy slip.

Conditions in China Show Improvement

SHANGHAI, June 5.—With foreign troops posted at strategic points through the city, serious outbreaks as a result of the student and labor agitation have ceased, but the general strike is spreading, and numerous isolated attacks against individuals, notably British and Japanese, are reported.

Firm action by the defense force, consisting of all able-bodied foreigners, reinforced by British and American naval detachments, have caused cessation of mob rioting.

Foreign naval forces received further reinforcements late today, when the seventy Japanese marines landed city.

from the cruiser *Tatsuta*, which has just arrived. The *Tatsuta* carries a total of 500 marines which will be held in readiness in case of new rioting.

Coolies, who assist the loading and unloading of ships, have joined the general strike, paralyzing work at the waterfront, and causing foreign cargoes to pile up unattended.

Anti-foreign agitation continues, and foreign boycotts are being ordered, but generally the situation is improving and representatives of the foreign powers believe they have it under control.

Reports from Hong Kong describe a condition approaching anarchy, due to fighting among the Chinese factions. Foreigners are leaving the city.
