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ALLIES' NOTE TO GERMANY BITTER

LONDON, June 6.—Thirteen specified defaults in the military provisions of the Versailles treaty are charged against Germany in the allied note demanding rectification of these violations before the Cologne area is evacuated.

5. Recruiting and military training of ambassadors, was made public here yesterday. It is designed to be conciliatory, but it is likely to arouse a storm in Germany.

This, the note adds, would be directly contrary to the Versailles treaty, which provided the army was to be used exclusively to maintain international order and control on the German frontiers.

"It is this circumstance," the note declares, which renders the totality of the defaults such a serious menace.

The allies demand that the German police be reduced from 180,000 to 150,000 men and that the force be a strict state and municipal organization without military character.

When these and other demands are complied with, not only will Cologne be evacuated, but the allied military control commission will be withdrawn.

1. The organization of the German police, which is too large and operates along military lines.

2. Some German factories are still able to make munitions.

3. Germany has failed to deliver certain surplus war material to the allies.

4. The army is organized contrary to the Versailles treaty, in the maintenance of a general staff.

6. Recruiting and military training must be regulated.

7. Germany has defaulted in respect to the manufacture and possession of war materials.

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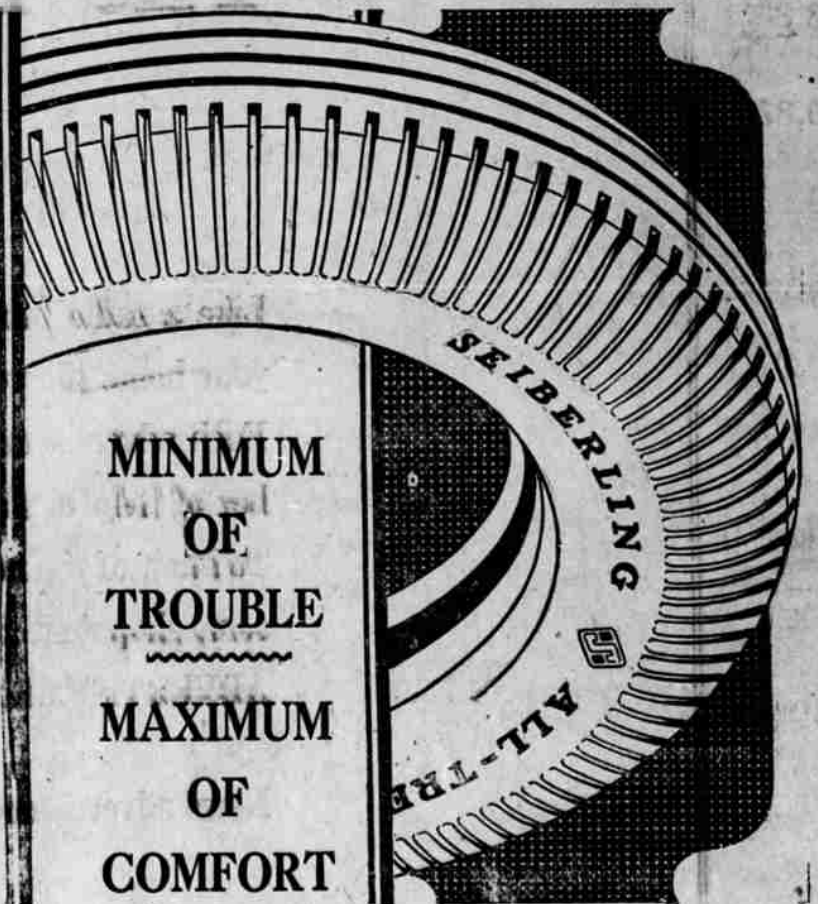
