

Father's Tombstone Falls To Kill Boy

CHICAGO, June 6.—Lester Le-clochs, 5, died today from injuries received when his father's tombstone toppled over on him and fractured his skull.

With his mother he had gone to the cemetery to place flowers on the grave. As the mother, crying softly, was paying little attention to him, he restlessly started to climb the three foot shaft and the marble slab crushed his head as the tiny lad fell beneath its weight. He was hurried to a hospital, but died shortly afterward.

Boy Scouts Cooperate In Stop Forest Fires

Boy Scouts all over Oregon will co-operate in the stop forest fire movement the week preceding July 4th this year, according to Cecil A. Cook, Scout executive for Klamath, Jackson and Josephine counties.

The boys will sign membership in the association, and will be drilled in right methods of building and caring for camp fires in the woods, and more particularly the thorough extinguishing of their fires before leaving camp. A camp fire which has been used, then extinguished by Boy Scouts, will bear a particular mark or "Indian sign" according to Cook. The boys will also be instructed in what to do upon discovery of a fire in the woods.

Last year Boy Scouts and Camp Fire Girls in Klamath county signed up nearly 7,000 members, and as a tribute to the effectiveness of their work, there was not a man-set fire reported for three weeks following the stop forest fires campaign.

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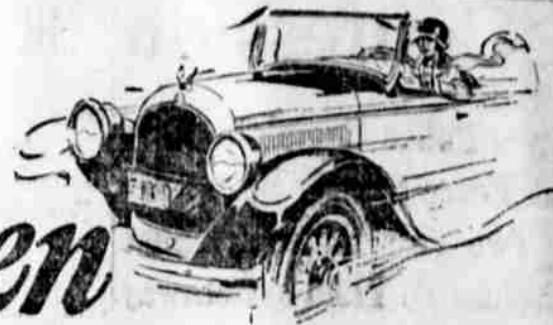
