

CARPENTER UNION ELECTS OFFICERS

Union Pledges Support To Merchants Maintaining 6 p. m. Closing Hour

At a special meeting of Carpenters' Union No. 190 held in the Central Labor Union Hall, the following officers were elected for the ensuing term: president, J. F. Goldsworthy; vice president, C. E. Green; financial secretary, Harry Gray; recording secretary, C. D. Long; treasurer, C. A. Bundy; conductor, R. G. Gentry; trustees, W. A. Koenig, H. K. Hohlman and R. L. Lane; warden, T. B. Westfall. As delegates to the Central Labor Union, C. D. Long, Harry Gray and C. A. Bundy, were chosen. All will take office at the first meeting in July.

Many matters of interest were discussed, among which was the question of wage agreements with the general contractors; it being apparent that something should be done to stabilize the building industry in this city. No increase is being sought at this time.

The formation of a Building Trades Council was also considered, as the recent chartering of the plasterers and other basic trades in the industry makes this move possible.

The union pledged support to the retail merchants in maintaining the 6 o'clock closing hour, and have decided to do all their shopping early in the day, it being the sentiment of the meeting that a longer day would be detrimental to the interests of the workers in the stores.

Another outstanding young bull who will doubtless leave his mark on the future beef cattle industry of Klamath County arrived by express last night from the famous Blackhawk Farm in Contra Costa County, California, consigned to West & Watters of the Summers District. This young prince of the blood is sired by the famous Imp. Collynie Clipper Crest of the Blackhawk herd at Diablo and won first prize in the 2-year-old bull class at the American Royal Show at Kansas City last fall. The dam of the youngster is one of the Cruickshank Violet cows, also owned by the Blackhawk Ranch and has many blue and purple ribbons to her credit. He will be shown at the coming County Fair here and up the valley circuit to the State Fair, in the senior bull calf class.

L. A. West is one of the pioneer Shorthorn breeders of this section of the state, having started in business in Klamath County in 1920. The following year he took as partner, Tom Watters, and since that time

their steadily increasing herd of purebreds has been notable at not only the county shows but the State Fair and Pacific International, all of which will have large herds and individual entries from the West & Watters herd this year.

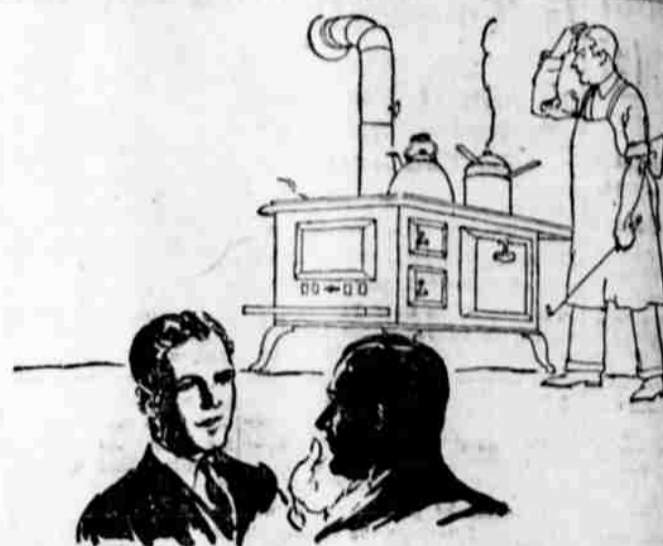
