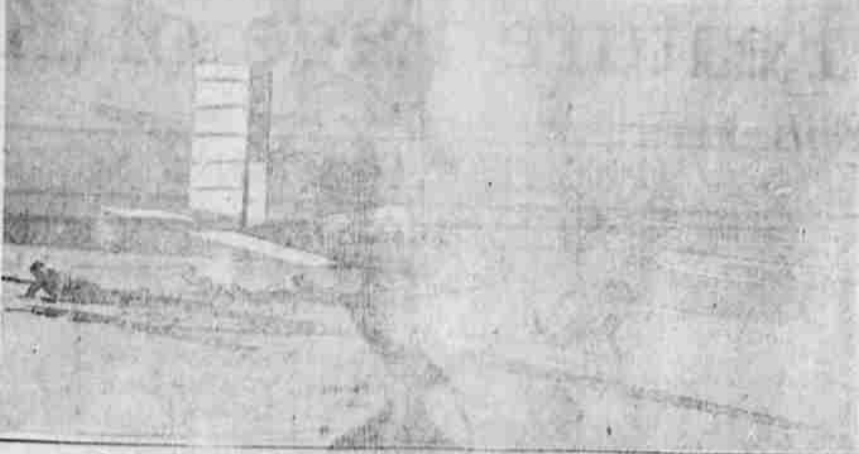

Germany Develops Motorless Land and Water Plane



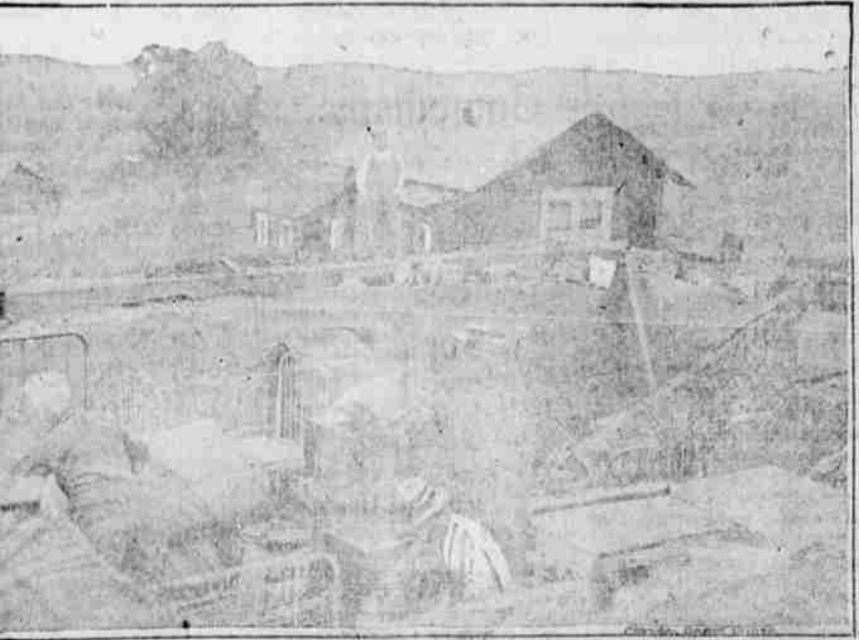

Where President Will Sleep at Swampscott



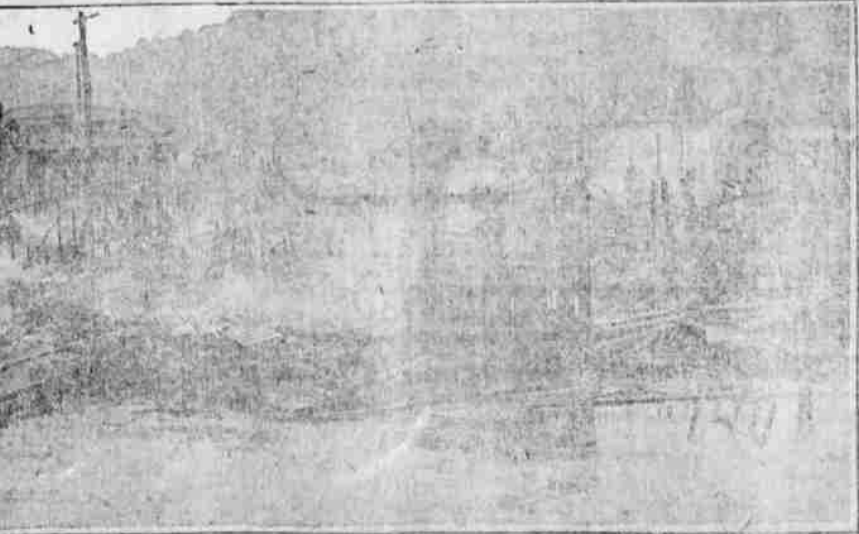
