According to the crowd the strained relations between Burke and Buzukos arose last night over a little personal difficulty which roused Burke's "Irish" and the Klamath wrestler who holds the reputation among local fans of always standing for a clean game, shoved Buzukos all over his dressing room, informing him that he was as yellow as a pumpkin and quite a bit more.

Buzukos claimed that there wasn't enough money in sight to justify a mat artist of his standing doing his stuff, but when the extra purse was gathered up, the Greek made the mistake of going in. After eight minutes of slamming Burke clamped a Frank Gotch toe hold on the ex-champ which made him squawk like a sick cat. The next fall came after Burke had slammed the Greek down with crotch holds three or four times, finally pinning this bird down flat after nine minutes of roughing it.

In a semi-final wrestling bout, Fleming, a local boy put Wild Bill Briar, of Wieser, Idaho, away after eight minutes of good tight wrestling which took all Fleming had.
