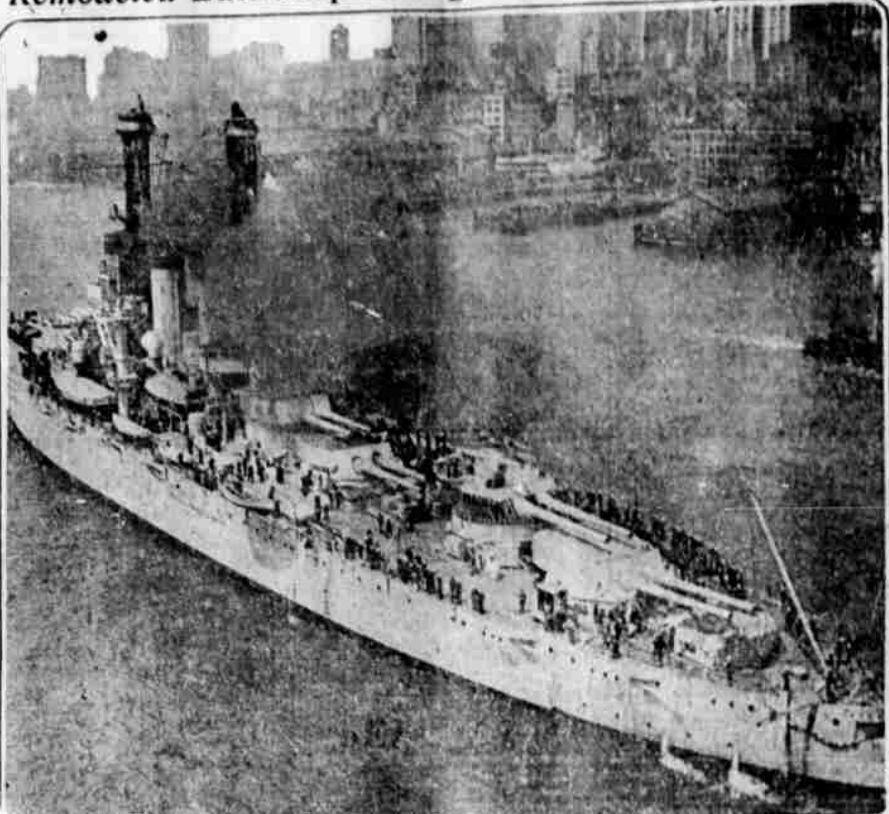
From Merrill—John Reginato of the Merrill road, where he conducts a ranch, was among the business visitors in the city the early part of the week.
