

PLANS FINISHED FOR BOY SCOUTS' SUMMER WORK

Plans for the Boy Scout work for the entire summer were outlined recently by Cecil A. Cook, scout executive for the Crater Lake council, who left the early part of the week for his home in Medford, expecting to return to Klamath Falls June 20.

The first scout bulletin of the camps to be issued has been received by the scouts of Klamath Falls, as well as the scouts of Jackson and Josephine counties.

The bulletin included the following announcements:

Registered scouts in good standing under this council are notified that camp this year will open July 6th, and be in operation until August 15, divided into six periods.

The council camping department, in charge of Councilman O. L. Cornwall, who operated the scout camp last year, is offering a program of activities based strictly on the scout oath and law, with Scout Executive Cecil A. Cook in charge.

Every precaution will be taken to insure ample housing, excellent food, and responsible leaders so that a scout will come away from camp with a rich experience that will benefit him for all time.

The fee for one week is \$6, two weeks \$11, this amount including transportation. Periods of camping include from July 6 to July 13; July 13 to July 20; July 20 to July 27; July 27 to August 3; August 3 to August 10; August 10 to August 17. Boys are permitted to remain for as long a period as they wish, from one week to all of the season.

In company with J. A. Gordon, Cecil A. Cook spent the past weekend at Lake of the Woods, plating off the section of the lake shore, given them by the forest service for use as a Boy Scout camp. Lake of the Woods has been chosen as an ideal spot as the water is warmer than any other body of water, for swimming purposes. As one of the main features on the schedule includes water activities, this was found to be an asset towards the location of the camp.

PEOPLE OF MERRILL ENDORSES RAILROADS

privately owned land now under irrigation and ready for settlement also waits on railway transportation.

For years, we have desired railway construction into this region and feel that possibility of speeding construction is a most important consideration, and in view thereof, it is our opinion that the Southern Pacific company with its facilities immediately at hand should be first urged to prepare showing necessary to permit such construction and to undertake same promptly, and we hereby pledge the assistance of this community in urging the granting of permit by the interstate commerce commission.

Should the Hill system be granted the right and actually construct a line into Klamath Falls and the Southern Pacific has not then applied to the interstate commerce commission for authority to construct its projected line to this valley, we at that time may deem it necessary to offer our support to the Hill lines.

Now, Therefore Be It Resolved by this mass meeting that we go on record favoring the construction of the Modoc Northern by either of the great railway systems in this valley.

Whereas: The building of a railroad through this valley is necessary not only to our prosperity and proper development, but to our very existence, and,

Whereas: We believe that the construction and entry of the Oregon Trunk railway into Klamath Falls, Oregon, would be of incalculable benefit to Merrill and vicinity, Tule lake valley and Malin, The Klamath-California reclamation project, and Klamath county generally.

Now, Therefore Be It Resolved by this mass meeting of the citizens and land owners of this valley, that we respectfully urge that the re-

quest of the Oregon Trunk railway company to the interstate commerce commission for permission to construct and operate a railway line from Bend, Oregon to Klamath Falls, Oregon be granted, and,

Be It Further Resolved, that we believe it would be a wise policy for the interstate commerce commission to grant to the Oregon Trunk railway company common user of the trackage of the Southern Pacific railway company from Odell to Skookum, Oregon to Klamath Falls, Oregon; Provided, however, that if such right is granted and accepted by the Southern Pacific railway company, that permission be given the said Oregon Trunk railway company to begin immediate construction of a line from Bend, Oregon to Klamath Falls, Oregon.

Whereas: The foregoing resolutions were made and adopted by this meeting assembled, with the thought in mind that we were working for the best welfare of Klamath county and its citizenry.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the secretary of the Merrill Community club be instructed to place a copy of these resolutions in the hands of the Evening Herald, and

the Klamath News, both being newspapers of Klamath county, Oregon, and to forward a copy to the office of the interstate commerce commission.
