**COOLIDGE FAVORS TAX REVISION PROPOSALS**

WASHINGTON, June 12.—President Coolidge would favor a general tax revision plan, which would take the federal government from the inheritance tax field, and the states from the income tax field. He believes, however, that its double retirement is impractical, because many states are dependent upon

their income levies to meet expenses. Under the suggested plan advanced by Senator Smoot of Utah, chairman of the finance committee, the federal government alone would collect income taxes, the states alone inheritance taxes. The president is in favor of abolishing federal inheritance taxes.
