

# Snappy Sporting Notes

## REDS WIN EIGHTH CONSECUTIVE GAME; SOX SPILL ATHLETICS IN ONE-SIDED GAME; RACE IS CLOSE

NEW YORK, June 12.—The floor gave way beneath the Brooklyn Dodgers this afternoon and they tumbled from second place to third in the National league. When night came, the Dodgers were dangling by a nail in third spot, with a healthy chance of dropping to fourth before the end of the week.

It was the culmination of a chain of sad events for the Dodgers when they were at last evicted from the runner-up spot in their league, which they had held since the latter part of last season, a gang of aged ball players who were the next best squad after the Giants.

The Reds shut out the Dodgers 6 to 0 in Cincinnati, thereby stretching their era of prosperity to eight consecutive games without a defeat. The Dodgers, on the other hand, with their pitching staff limping badly, have been consistent losers thus far on the tour, and must yet meet the Pirates, after that they meet more harsh opposition in the Giants, who will entertain them with six games in 10 days.

The Pirates went into second place because they beat the Giants in Pittsburgh this afternoon 6 to 2. The Reds are only half a game behind the Dodgers now.

The Cubs, who won two games from the Giants this week, got out of last place, advancing to seventh when they beat the Boston Braves, 9 to 7 in a booby prize contest in Chicago. The Braves went to the bottom.

Rogers Hornsby's Cards won their ninth victory in the 13 games they have played under him. The Phillies were the sacrifices. Score 4 to 1. Bill Sherdel pitched all the way for the Cards. He is the fourth or fifth Cardinal pitcher to last a full game in several years. Hornsby has been letting his pitchers stay in the box as long as they can last, unlike Branch Rickey, his predecessor, who used to yank them whether they were pitching well or poorly.

In the American league the Athletics lost again to the White Sox, this time by the bulky numbers of 15 to 1. The Athletics can't afford to lose many, for the Senators won today from the Tigers, and are only one and a half games back. The score here was 7 to 2.

There was another sad show at the Yankee stadium, when the Indians beat the Yanks 5 to 2. Inasmuch as the Boston Red Sox beat the Browns, the Yanks are nearing the bottom.

In the early part of the fighting Terris slipped to his knee several times, but was up and at his opponent before the referee could begin giving him the count.
