Of the 24 children examined, 14 were white and 10 were Indian children. Defects found were to eyes, 4; ears, 2; tonsils, 8; adenoids, 5; lungs, 3; liver, 1; nose, 1; skin, 1; hernia, 1. The number advised to take the children to the family physician were 8. This, according to Miss Pricke, being an especially small number.
