KLAMATH GIRLS AND BOYS OFF FOR CORVALLIS

The first shot in an effort to make the boys and girls farm club work the best known of Oregon's constructive activities will be fired here at 6 o'clock this morning in front of the County Courthouse. It will be aimed through the twinkling shutters of a motion picture camera.

At 6 o'clock a. m. more than sixty boys and girls from all parts of Klamath County will gather here with grips and bedding. Half an hour later they will be on their way to attend the twelfth annual boys and girls summer school which will be held June 15 to 27 at the Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis.

Through the cooperation of the Southern Pacific company the complete story of the summer school is to be told in motion pictures.

These pictures will show the youngsters on their way to Corvallis and will tell, for the information of all Oregon, how the boys and girls live while at the summer camp. They will be shown at work and at play. Through the medium of these pictures parents who have not been at Corvallis may know exactly how it goes with the children; how they eat; how they sleep and where; what they're taught and how and what care has been taken to insure their safety, health and happiness. The pictures will show those that have helped financially to make these summer camps possible that their money is being spent to good advantage.

Klamath Falls has been chosen for the first "shot" because for the last four years Klamath county has contributed the largest delegation to the Corvallis camp. By showing the start of the Klamath boys and girls, following them to Ashland, with shots by the way showing glimpses of Klamath's lovely scenery, "shoot- ing" them as they board the Southern Pacific special at Ashland, and on the train, the camera will convey a good idea of how all the boys and girls get to Corvallis.

State Traffic Man Nabs Counterfeiter

State Traffic Officer Earl Houston spent a busy Saturday yesterday when he made two arrests and investigated into one violation of the state traffic laws, finding an Oregon license counterfeited.

Passing a Chalmers car driven by W. H. Glasson yesterday afternoon, soon after 4 p. m., Houston noticed the queer appearance of the license plate, No. 128-745, Oregon, 1925. Upon examination, the plate was found to be an old license of 1924.

Painted the conventional yellow and black of this year's color and the "4" on the year numeral, pounded into a "5." The "1" on the license number had also been painted to conform with this year's type.

Glasson was brought before Police Judge Gaghagen, and when questioned, put up a plea of no finances, a wife and a large family. He was let off with a fine of \$10 and costs, and his license plates removed from the car.

According to Officer Houston this is only the second case to come to his notice this year, the other counterfeited made on a 1924 license in Bend.

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Mexican President Will Answer Note

MEXICO CITY, June 13.—Secretary of State Kellogg's warning to Mexico to maintain order and keep her obligations probably will be answered soon by President Calles.

Hitherto no official comment has been forthcoming, but unofficial observations show that the Kellogg warning is viewed here as ill-timed and possibly conducive to encouraging disgruntled elements in obstructing the government's program.

"Yankee imperialism," as the communists term the United States policy, was to be protested tonight at a communist meeting.

The leaders also proposed to object to what they termed American Ambassador Sheffield's domination of the Mexican government.

The meeting scheduled for some days past, was not a result of the Kellogg statement.

Charge H. Arthur Schonfeld has found it necessary to make representations to the government since Sheffield's departure in the matter of the Evans ranch murder.
