AUTOMATIC SUB-STATION OPERATING IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, June 13.—Operation of the largest full-automatic sub-station in the United States has begun in the system of the Northwestern Electric company that serves Vancouver, Wash., and North Portland.

The equipment, which cost approximately \$80,000, is capable of producing a rated horsepower of 13,333 at 11,000 volts.

Heretofore all stations of this size have been manually, instead of automatically, controlled.

Two Soldiers Given D. S. C. For Part In Killing Moro Chief

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Distinguished service crosses for heroism in action have been awarded William in action have been given retired, of South San Antonio, Tex., and Bernard A. Barty, former corporal, of Englewood, N. J., the war department announced today.

Both men were members of a force which killed Jikiri, Moro bandit and pirate, known as the "Terror of Jolo."

In July, 1909, the force of which Wendell and Barty were members, cornered the bandit and his followers in a cave. When they entered the cave the Moros made a final rush, cutting down several Americans before being slain.
