SUPREME COURT UPHOLDS LIQUOR

SALEM, June 15.—One's residence is no more sacred than one's person, in the eyes of the Oregon law, and the same information that is required to secure the arrest and search of a person is sufficient to justify the issuance of a warrant covering the search of a residence. This is the holding of the Oregon supreme court, which Tuesday in an opinion by Justice Bean affirmed the judgment of Judge Duffy of the Multnomah county circuit court in the case of the state of Oregon vs. Albert Quartier. Quartier was convicted on a charge of possessing a still, which was uncovered in his residence in Portland, when it was searched by deputies from the office of the state prohibition commissioner. Quartier attacked the right of the officers to search his home, on the ground that the magistrate who issued the search warrant had failed to take the deposition of the complaining witness. This complaint is dismissed by the supreme court with the statement that "it has never been the practice in this state to require the deposition of witnesses in addition to the sworn statement of an informant as a prerequisite to the issuance of warrant of arrest."

MARRIED MEN WITH INCOMES LESS THAN \$4,000 TO BE AIDED

WASHINGTON, June 16.—Relief from federal income taxes may be afforded married men with incomes of less than \$4,000, treasury and congressional tax experts said yesterday. Chairman Smoot of the senate finance committee, is one of a group of members of the upper body in favor of the plan. "Any man who earns \$4,000 or more a year," said Smoot, "ought to be willing to chip in \$5 or \$10 toward running his government. Tax paying is a patriotic duty, and I don't see how any one with such an income could object to donating such a small portion of it to his country each year."

PARIS, June 16.—(United News)—The body of Alice Mary Crumpton, of Chicago, who killed herself because "no one would marry her," lies unclaimed in a Paris morgue. The American consulate and the guaranty trust company have cabled her relatives in the United States, but have received no reply. A journey to Milan where Crumpton is believed to have been her fiancé, an Italian preceded the suicide. Their engagement is believed to have broken while she was in Italy. She shot herself in a taxicab as it sped through the "bois de boulogne."
