

THOUSANDS VETS TO BE AIDED BY THE ENDOWMENT

On the day war was declared with Germany, Enoch B. Carlson, a postal employe in Portland, beat his 31st birthday by 13 days and enlisted in the army. He was commissioned from the first officers' training camp at the Presidio, San Francisco, and sailed for the war zone Dec. 13, 1917. He finally was assigned to the military police of the 6th corps, then he saw duty in the Meuse-Argonne. He returned to the states June 30, 1919.

Today Carlson lies ill in the U. S. Veterans' Hospital No. 94, Am-



erican Lake, Wash., where he has been since August, 1924, when the American Legion aided him. Before that he was in the hospital at Boise, Idaho.

His illness is the result of being gassed and an attack of influenza while across.

There are thousands of war veterans who today need attention and for whom the American Legion, in conjunction with government agencies, is trying to obtain permanent cure. It is the continuation of its endeavor to aid disabled veterans, and for the care of veterans' orphans, that the American Legion Endowment Fund of \$5,000,000 is being established. Oregon is now working to raise this state's share of the fund.

The legion's persistent efforts obtained hospitalization for Carlson. Recently he has been critically ill. He was sick three years before he obtained hospitalization, or enough compensation to take care of him.

Carlson has been unable to work since 1920. He tried vocational training at Oregon Agricultural college, but after six weeks was forced to give it up. The legion was appealed to and aid was obtained.

That the provisions of section 2455, revised statutes, be, and the same are hereby, extended to class three of the lands formerly embraced by what are known as the Oregon and California railroad grants, title to which was reverted in the United States under the provisions of the act approved June 9, 1916 (thirty-ninth statutes at large, page 218.) Provided, that no sales hereunder shall be made for less than \$2.50 per acre, and the appraised value of the timber on the land, nor until such lands shall have been subject to homestead entry for a period of two years. Provided further that the proceeds of such sales shall be applied in the manner prescribed in said act of June 9, 1916 (thirty-ninth statutes at large, page 218.) Approved May 25, 1925.

MEXICAN PRESS ASSAULTS U. S.

MEXICO CITY, June 17.—While the Mexican press continues to assault the American secretary of state for his recent warning to Mexico the outstanding result of Kellogg's words thus far has been the complete solidification of President Calles' political position. Now that Calles has delivered his reply in defense of Mexico's sovereignty, he has strengthened his position so greatly that any attempt at revolution would be futile from the beginning.

Although Kellogg's words were resented by many Mexicans as offering hope to the disgruntled elements among the population, Calles clearly has gained by the exchange of thought.

Expressions of support from leaders of all parties and from all sections of Mexico continue to pour into the presidential palace. It even has been suggested that this solidification was Kellogg's exact, although disguised purpose. Calles will have a freer hand in carrying out his program as a result of the American warning and his reply to it.

POLICE OFFICERS ARE EXONERATED

JERSEY CITY, N. J., June 17.—Ten officers of the Weehawken police department were acquitted of charges of rum conspiracy late Tuesday night by a jury which had been out more than seven hours.

"We find all of the ten defendants not guilty," Louis Jansen, foreman of the jury announced.

Besides the ten defendants, two others, Police Lieut. Phillip McNulty and Patrolman John Fischer, were acquitted earlier in the day at the direction of Judge Egan with consent of the prosecutor.

It was the second trial of the 12 men. At the first trial, last November, the jury failed to agree on a verdict.
