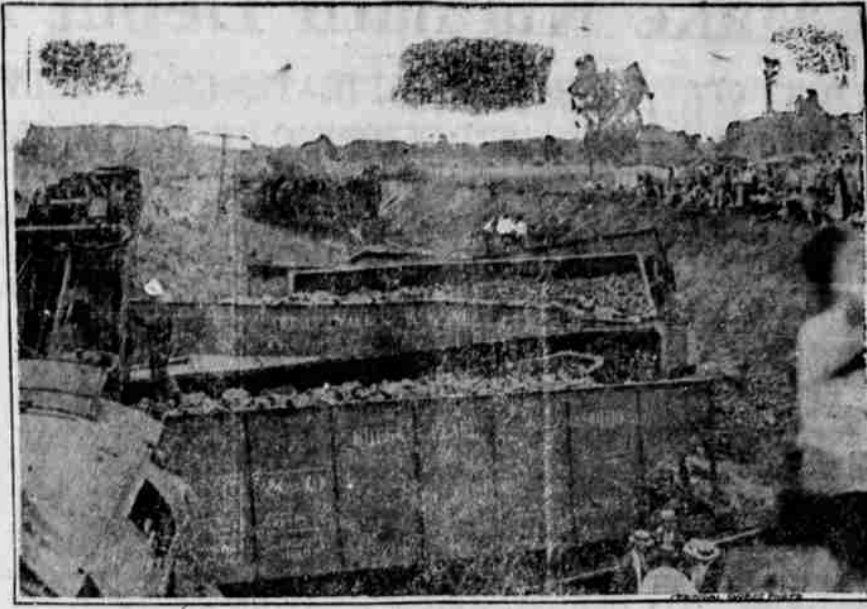

TO STIMULATE INTEREST HERE IN PIG RAISING

To stimulate interest in pork production, to widen the knowledge of the child in club work to other branches of livestock, and to provide a means for the winner to enter the pig club of his or her district next year, Roy Nelson, superintendent of the hog raising of the county fair, has offered a fall pig of either sex to the winner of class 1 in the dairy calf division at the fair.

Mr. Nelson is a strong believer in keeping the boy on the farm, and from personal observation and past experience, thinks no stronger impetus exists for this end than to give the farm boy or girl good animals with which to work. Mr. Nelson's milking shorthorn and Poland Chinas give substantial evidence of careful and interested management, feeding and culling. In choosing class 1 of the dairy calf project as the medium through which to offer this valuable prize, Mr. Nelson is assured that the piggy will have plenty of milk, as the club members of this division are compelled to care and manage one or more purebred and registered calves of any dairy breed, dropped since August 1st, 1924, for a period of at least four months, and to show same at the county fair with their records of time expended, feed costs and other pertinent items.

To the average child the offer of a live animal for which their attention and care is demanded, is far more appealing than a small cash prize would be.

Work On Course To Start During Week

Papers for the Reames tract were received yesterday afternoon and all final touches put to the plans of the Klamath Golf and Country club for the initial work to be started on the course. The aged woman who was 72 at the time of her death, was well known in Klamath county, having lived in this section of Oregon for more than 25 years. She was born in Mollala, Oregon, and was the widow of C. M. Ramsby, who passed away five years ago in Ashland.

Besides her two children, Mrs. Martin and Mr. Ramsby, she is survived by her brothers, W. D. Woodcock, of Richmond, Calif., Newton Woodcock of San Francisco, and a sister, Mrs. L. D. Klinger of Dufur, Oregon. Interment will be in Ashland cemetery tomorrow afternoon, where Mrs. Ramsby will be buried in the family plot by her husband.
