## BIG FIGHT CARD BILLED AT WLUL KSE ON JUNE 26

Wlul-Kse, on June 26, will be the scene of four boxing bouts that should prove to be one of the stellar events of a well arranged sports program, that is to take place during the Klamath Indian convention, which starts the twenty-second, and continues until and inclusive of June 30. The fight card is composed of participants well known in Klamath Falls and vicinity.

The one exception to local fame is Frankie Murphy, the New Orleans light heavyweight. Murphy has only been here a week or ten days, and aside from his well known reputation as a boxer, that preceded his arrival, he has won a home with fans by his classy work in the local gymnasium. Pitted against Murphy in the final event will be Jim (Firpo) Gorman. Gorman appeared here in a ten-round go with Sam Olson a short time ago, and lost the decision to the man that conquered

Rocco Strombo in Tuesday night's card. It has been learned since his fight with Olson that Gorman was suffering from muscular rheumatism when he fought the husky Swede, and was unable to stage the fight he is capable of when in condition.

Gorman has a draw with Fred Fulton. The Rochester plasterer was at his best when he met Jim, and was held even. Gorman has been in training since he met Olson and is steadily rounding into form.

In the semi-windup Joe Coffman will be pitted against Jack Crim. Neither of these boys need an introduction to fight followers in this vicinity. Coffman has stowed away two fights in his short stay here. One of them was with Crim in which he knocked Jack out. Crim has been working hard since the Coffman bout and looks to be in fine shape and his friends are glad to see him get a chance to regain the set back that he received at the hands of the clever Portland welter.

Hyne Myers and Wilbur Harrington will be the contestants in the special event and it is needless to say that this match should prove interesting. This also is a return fight for it was Hyne that caught Wilbur on the bottom and stopped a string of victories that Harrington had been running up.

The curtain raiser will be Gunboat Smith and Joe Walters.

## EVERETT SCOTT WISHED OFF ON WASH. BY YANKS

NEW YORK, June 17.—(United News)—Everett Scott, an old ball player of 33, who didn't miss a scheduled game of ball in more than eight seasons, ambled out of New York today on kinky legs and feet of clay, to join the Washington Senators.

He used to be a pretty heroic piece in the baseball gallery. Two years ago, just before he trotted out to pick up his ragged old glove with the hole in the palm, to field his post for the one thousandth time, without missing a game, Warren G. Harding, who was then president, gave him a watch or some cuff links, or some similar souvenir, and cheered him along with the presidential equivalent of "kid, you're there!"

It wasn't Scott's fault that the legs got knotty beneath him after he had played in 1397 ball games without being reported absent once. But nobody but Scott was responsible for what happened to the feet. They turned from heroic marble to very common human material the day that Miller Huggins, the manager of the New York Yanks, finally took him out of the line-up, and replaced him with a new fellow, a kid, named Wanniger. That was a few weeks ago. Cootty moped on the bench, hoping until there were two men out in the ninth inning, that Huggins would send him in for the final put-out, and thereby save his record. But Huggins did not call on him.

Scott crabbled, and crabbled sounded unusually harsh, coming from a fellow who had been kept in the line-up quite a spell beyond his time, just out of consideration for his feelings and his record. Other ball players, notably Casey Stengel, the tourist of the major leagues, and old Jack Quinn, the pitcher, who had spent 12 years with the Yanks, had been displaced by younger fellows when they still had lots of play left in them, but had taken the rap with a cracked laugh.

## Pancho Villa in Frisco To Train

SAN FRANCISCO, June 17.—Pancho Villa, flyweight champion, arrived here today from his home in the Philippine islands, and went immediately into training for his fight at Oakland on July 4, with Jimmy McLarnin, Pacific coast flash. Frank Churchill, Villa's manager, confidentially told newspaper men who greeted the fighter, that he expected the champion to have an easy time with McLarnin. Villa's title will be at stake.

## REDS AND PIRATES GRADUALLY ARE SLIPPING UP ON THE GIANTS

Athletics Only 1 Game Behind Fighting Senators; Ty Cobb Gets Home Run With Bases Loaded Yesterday; Yanks Slaughtered

NEW YORK, June 17.—The Pirates and Reds are reeling in the slack. They are gradually pulling the New York Giants back from the long lead that John McGraw's team enjoyed when the present tour of the west began six weeks ago.

Wednesday the Reds, with Adolfo Luque pitching, shut out the Giants 1 to 0, and the Pirates beat the Dodgers 8 to 3. This brought the Pirates to a point just one and a half games behind the Giants, and left the Reds only three games away from the lead. When the Giants went to St. Louis to begin the western campaign, they were about six full games ahead of the Dodgers, then in second place, and further removed from the menace of the Pirates and Reds.

Both Giants and Dodgers have lost 8 out of 13 games on the tour. The Pirates have won 19 out of 13 games since the eastern teams came visiting, and the Reds have won eleven of their last dozen encounters, losing just one to the Dodgers on a day when Dazy Vance was in good shape.

There were only three games in

the National league today. The Cubs made it a clean sweep of the day for the western teams, defeating the Phillies 5 to 4.

The Athletics are still swinging their clubs in the frenzy that seized them in the eighth inning of their game with the Indians Monday afternoon, the inning in which they made 13 runs. They beat the Indians by another "big score" today, 19 to 3, and their total scoring from Monday's eighth to the last inning today was 35 runs in 17 innings.

The Senators won, too, beating the Browns 2 to 1. They are still one game behind the Athletics. For several days the Athletics and Giants went along stride for stride, leading their respective leagues, but now Connie Mack's athletes have won four more games than the Giants and lost three fewer.

The Tigers equalled the Athletics' stunt of scoring 15 runs in one inning, when the Yankee pitchers went wild in the sixth inning, at the New York stadium. Ty Cobb hit a home run with the bases full as a climax to the inning, and the Tigers won 19 to 1.

## SPORTS DONE BROWN

The Cleveland Indians once more seem to be in sore need of something or other—from a new manager to a flock of pitchers, a good infielder and an outfielder who can field and hit.

The other day, in a vain effort to find a winning combination, Manager Speaker shifted Joey Sewell from shortstop to second base. Sewell is the dapper chap with the foghorn voice, who saved the pennant for the Indians in 1920 by stepping into the shoes of Ray Chapman and playing phenomenal ball from August to the end of the campaign.

Sewell went into the lineup with practically no experience. He had shown his baseball brain, however, at the University of Alabama. He lacked fielding finesse, but Speaker labored to teach him that. He is now one of the greatest shortstops in the game.

Speaker moved him to second and put Spurgeon, young infielder, in short. Both Chick Fewster and Klugman had proved weak at the keystone sack.

Another sad blow to the Indians has been the failure of the popular and willing outfielder, Charley Jamieson, to hit his stride at bat. Jamie, one of the best ball hawks in the game today, has been a vital spark in the attacking machine of the Indians for the last five campaigns. Up to this spring he had been a real contender for league batting honors. He is unable himself to account for his failure to find his batting eye.

And, the worst of it is, Manager Speaker and Owner Barnard fail to see anybody right now who can help them out of the dilemma. They sent Riggs Stephenson, demon slugger, to the minors, firm in the belief that he was of no real value to the team, despite his slugging. He couldn't carry the fielding end of an infield or outfield job.

Harvey Hendrick couldn't earn his salt as a pinch hitter alone, so he was given the air. Two or three pitchers, counted on in the spring to deliver the goods, have been farmed out under option in the thought that they need another year of minor league work.

The Indians still have a batting power which once aroused and backed by some fairly consistent pitching, might put them into the pennant race for a time. But right now they seem to have shot their bolt.

Ran into Matt Hinkel, western fight promoter, again the other day. Hinkel had just seen Gene Tunney knock out Tommy Gibbons—the man who stayed 15 rounds with Dempsey.

Hinkel had little to say of Gibbons, but was enthusiastic about the young conqueror of the veteran heavy.

"Give Tunney another year and he will be ready for Jack Dempsey. And when they meet Tunney will beat Dempsey."

That was Hinkel's opinion of Gene.

Hinkel was one of the men who early saw in Jess Willard the youth and endurance that would defeat the crafty, dissipated Jack Johnson. He has "had the dope" on many other coming fighters and has given many of them a lift on their road to fame in his fight shows.

"Tunney is a good boxer. He is a cool, heady fighter. And he does not know the meaning of dinking it. That is what hurts many a good fighter—his willingness to crawl into a shell when the going gets rough.

"Gene hits hard, and with a knowledge of how to hit. None of his blows are wide swinging hay-makers. It will take a short, quick puncher to trap Dempsey. Tunney is that type."

Hinkel, however, feels that Dempsey will not enter the ring again. "He is a wealthy business man and his business does not include prize fighting," says Hinkel.

## MICKY WALKER NOW TRAINING FOR GREB

NEW YORK, June 17.—Mickey Walker, world's welterweight champion, who has been laid up with an infected toe, will resume training tomorrow for his fight with Harry Greb, world's middleweight champion. The bout is to be held in the Polo Grounds on July 2. Harry Wills and Charley Weinert, who are to meet in another feature bout on the benefit card, have resumed training after a short lay-off.

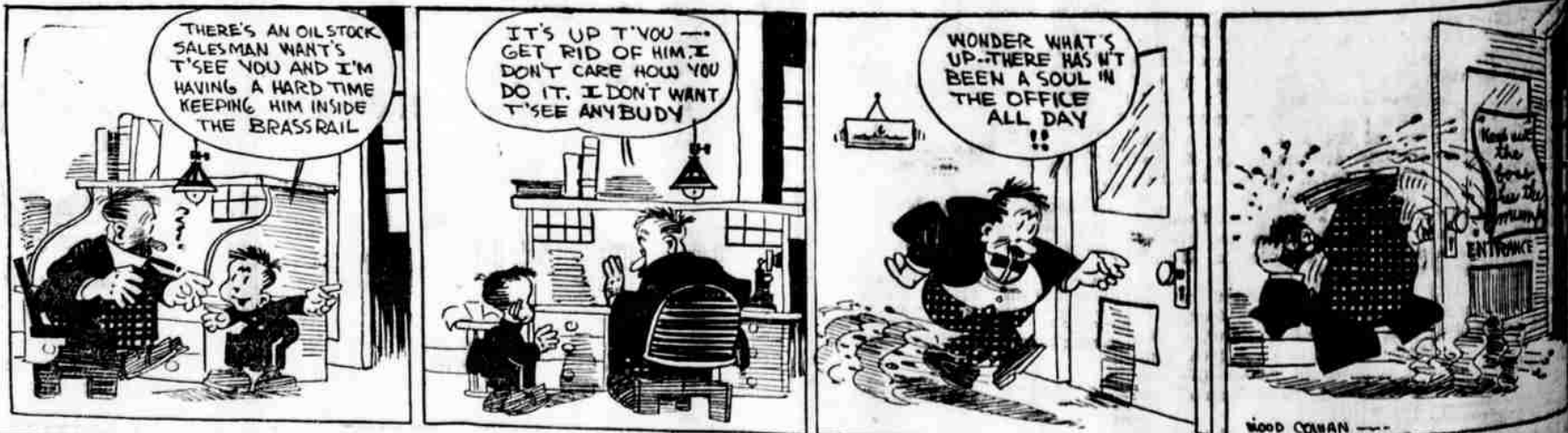
