

KLAMATH KIDDIES MAKING A NAME UP IN CORVALLIS

The Klamath county boys and girls club honor members, 70 in number, who made the trip to Corvallis for a two weeks' summer school course, last Sunday have already started winning honors for their county, according to Rev. C. C. Hulet, who returned home yesterday evening with Mrs. Hulet, after accompanying the local boys and girls on their trip to special train to the college town.

While it is too early yet to decide scholastic honors or what county will win out in all around club activity, on Monday the afternoon of the first day of the course, the boys of the Klamath county lined up a ball club which trimmed an all-star team made up of boys from all the rest of the school, about 200 in number, by a score of eight to six.

The trip down was made by S. P. special train of three cars routed from Ashland straight through to Corvallis with right-of-way over even the Shasta Limited, the Southern's crack train. There were 100 boys and girls in the entire party on this special, 70 from Klamath and 30 from Jackson and Josephine counties combined. Every boy or girl on this trip was an honor member of some club unit, and won this trip through outstanding club work. A special S. P. moving picture photographer accompanied the party and will film the work of the summer school student from start to finish, later broadcasting these films, advertising the work of some of some 500 boys and girls of Oregon who are taking part in the 1925 school.

DECISION HELD UP ON CROSSING

At the public service commission hearing at the court house, presided over by commissioners Thomas K. Campbell and E. W. Ostrander yesterday morning, relative to building an overhead crossing on The Dalles-California highway, over the S. P. main line 30 miles north of Kirk, a final decision in the matter was withheld for two weeks, and meanwhile additional data bearing on the subject will be taken up by the commission at Salem.

From the testimony of various engineers introduced at yesterday's hearing, the overhead crossing will cost approximately \$26,000, and the apportioning of the cost between the United States and the S. P. is the only matter that remains to be decided by the commission.

This particular crossing is located on the Deschutes national forest reserve, and for that reason the county is not a party in assuming a portion of the cost as is the usual case. Mr. Campbell pointed out that commissioners Campbell and Ostrander will both remain over here for the big railroad reception for the Hill railway officials at the White Pelican hotel tonight.

CHARLEY BRYAN TO BE INDICTED

LINCOLN, Neb., June 19.—Chas. W. Bryan, democratic vice presidential nominee in 1924, and brother of W. J. Bryan, the silver tongued veteran of the stump, and Samuel McKelvie, both former governors of Nebraska, may face criminal prosecution.

Attorney General Spillman made this announcement today, following receipt of a letter from George Johnson, commissioner of public works, during the McKelvie administration, asking criminal and civil action be instituted against McKelvie to collect over-payments alleged to have been made to road contractors.

In his letter Johnson asked Spill-

man to speed the McKelvie case so "that criminal and civil proceedings might be filed against Bryan." Johnson, while not detailing his allegations, charges ex-Governor Bryan with violation of the state corrupt practices act; violation of the state budget law; forcing a deficit to embarrass the previous administration; violation of the section 8359 of the statutes of 1922, by fraudulent use of the state revolving fund; for fraudulent use of funds received from the government and for fraudulent use of the mails in connection with his private coal company.

Bryan, who succeeded McKelvie as governor, is on a speaking tour and will not return to Lincoln for several weeks.

MacMillan Moving North To Find Land

BOSTON, June 19.—As Roald Amundsen returns southward from the polar flight that established the absence of land in the European sector of the polar basin, Donald B. MacMillan is moving northward to learn what lies in the North American side and Siberian sector of the top of the world. When MacMillan returns the existence of a hitherto unknown continent in the north probably will be established or disproved.

If a new continent exists it must lie within the 600 or more square miles of polar area which so far has resisted the efforts of men to penetrate it. This area lies due north of Bering strait and extends about 600 miles to within a short distance of the pole.

It is far to the westward of the path followed by Peary when he reached the pole and discovered no land there. Almost the whole of it lies within the polar ice cap.

POLAR REGIONS MAY CONTAIN MUCH OIL

WISCASSET, Maine, June 19.—Governor Ralph Brewster, making the first public reference to Canada's arctic claims since the Donald MacMillan expedition exempted here has authorized the American explorer to claim any land discovered in the name of the state of Maine.

"MacMillan has found oil oozing from the hills of the north," said Brewster, intimating that his opinion that had inspired rival claims. Brewster's announcement created a sensation and surprised many arctic experts both in and out of the expedition.

Evolution Law's Dad "Too Poor" to Attend Trial

The court martial was convened to handle cases arising out of the disturbances which began in Bulgaria with the attack on King Boris and bombing at Sveti Kral cathedral in April.
