PIRATES BANGING HARD AT GIANTS

Winning Streak Goes To 8 Games; Athletics Are Still Winning; Sam Gray Back In Game But Wild

PITTSBURGH, June 19.—Rube Ehrhardt held the Pirates to four hits during the first six innings today, and it looked for a while as though the Dodgers, who won yesterday's game, had hit the bottom of their decline and were again on the upgrade. The Pittsburgh team rallied, however, in the seventh, knocking out six runs in the one frame, and adding two in the next. As a consequence, the Pirates won 9 to 6, and the Brooklyn team slipped down closer to the St. Louis Cards, who hold fifth place.

The Cards, however, do not seem content to let the Dodgers sink below them, but have ambitions to pass them on the climb. They won their seventh straight victory today, shutting out the Braves, 3 to 0, although out hit 7 to 4.

The Phillies won another game from Chicago, 5 to 4, while the Giants defeated the Reds in Cincinnati by a similar score.

In the American league the Athletics won their fifth consecutive victory, by pounding the Browns 13 to 5. Sam Gray, in action for the first time since he sustained a broken thumb in St. Louis three weeks ago, started the game, but was wild and ineffective.

Washington defeated the Indians in Cleveland 7 to 5, after the Cleveland team had made an auspicious start, with three runs in the first inning.

The Yanks won a game at the stadium, defeating Chicago, 4 to 3, in 11 innings. Detroit shut out the Red Sox, 3 to 0, in Boston.

MICKEY WALKER TO MEET SHADE

Commission Rules He Must Meet Shade Or Cannot Fight Greb; Walker To Meet Shade July 21

NEW YORK, June 19.—Mickey Walker, world's welterweight champion, has accepted the challenge of Dave Shade for a title bout at Los Angeles on July 21.

Walker signed for the match at the office of the New York Athletic commission late Friday. His acceptance of Shade's challenge will permit him to fight Harry Greb at the Polo Grounds on July 2.

Walker, who had been given until June 23 to sign for the bout, was ordered to appear at the commission's offices Friday to affix his signature to articles submitted by Jack Boyle, of the Vernon club of Los Angeles.

The commission had ruled that unless Walker agreed to fight Shade, he could not appear in the ring with Greb on July 2, on the card arranged for the benefit of the Italian hospital fund.

THRILLING SHELL RACE WON BY ELI

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 19.—

John Harvard lost his shirt to Yale this evening, as the blue-dipped spoons of the Yale varsity crew, unbeaten in three years, flipped across the line at the finish of their four-mile boat race on the Connecticut Thames, more than a length in front of the gasping Harvard men.

As soon as they could right themselves in their boat, Harvard's oarsmen bowed their backs and peeled the shirts over their heads to toss them across the gap of water to their opponents in the Yale shell. It was the final humiliation for Mister Harvard, who just barely saved himself enough garmenture to meet the requirements of decency; he already had lost to Yale in football, baseball and track, and everything depended on the eight fellows manning his sweeps in the varsity boat race which is the last big convulsion of the athletic relations between Harvard and Yale.

The quaint custom of betting shirt for shirt, sent the Harvard crew paddling back to the famous red top, that rickety, red-roofed frame boat house, where so many Harvard crews have shoved off for better or for worse, naked from the belt lines northward, and exposed to the scrutiny of the eastern aristocracy, which lined the rails of the greatest fleet of yachts that ever assembled in these waters.

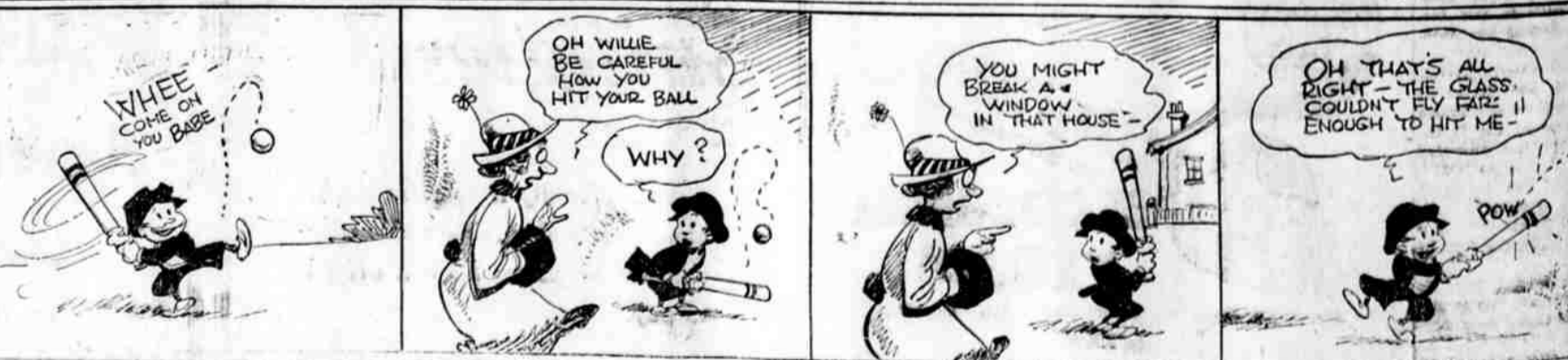
The proposed fight will be held in New York either September 15 or 19, Jole said.
