

Pelicans Tie For First Place Through 4-3 Win Over McCloud

LEAGUE LEADERS FORCED TO BOW TO PELICANS; MOHLER HURLS FINE BALL AND GETS AIRTIGHT SUPPORT

Sliger Fails To Do His Stuff And Over-Confident McClouds Lose; Mohler Strikes Out 12; Booth Of Pelicans Has Good Day At Bat

There had been wild tales circulating about Klamath Falls about this demon-devil McCloud baseball team. The score was 4 to 3, but it might have been 10 to 3 if the Pelicans didn't take such big leadoffs while on bases. The first inning was peaceful, both sides being retired 1, 2, 3.

Bayness went out, third to first, Mathews going to second on the play. Booth, whom we forgot to introduce last week, singled and Mathews dashed home from second.
