CHINESE IN U. S. RAISE MILLIONS FOR COUNTRYMEN

NEW YORK, June 24 (United News)—Chinese merchants and students in the United States, Canada and Mexico will raise \$1,000,000 to support the Chinese nationalist movement. New York Chinese who have undertaken to raise \$100,000 already have \$40,000 in hand.
