**ALL KINDS OF SURVEYORS MESSING AROUND WILLIAMSON RIVER; O. C. E. MEN SLEUTHING ON HILL ENGINEERS**

D. O. (Buck) Williams, cattle rancher from the head of the Big Marsh on the Upper Williamson river, who was in town last night, reports the woods full of railroad surveyors up in his country. The Hill roads have one crew camped on Williams' ranch, which holds a rather strategic position in the proposed railroad invasion of the Klamath country since the much sought low pass, between the Williamson and Sprague river basin is located adjoining the Buck Williams place. The O. C. & E. surveyors are also around there, but they seem to be busier keeping tabs on what the Hill surveyors are doing rather than running many lines themselves, according to Williams. This divide in the watershed between the Sprague and the Big Marsh is around 400 feet high, but owing to the policy of the Northern roads in their proposed extension down

here not to establish a grade greater than one percent, getting a line projected up over this pass has required a great deal of reconitering and preliminary work. Everywhere the surveyors go they leave a line of stakes, Williams said, and this has been responsible for a lot of small ranchers getting the idea that a main trans-continental line was coming right through their places. One Indian family owning a small mountain ranch was terribly excited, when the surveyors ran a line which took off a corner of their log barn. The crew told this family that it was getting so late now that there probably wouldn't be much grading done this year but dirt would sure be flying around there the first thing in the Spring. "I guess that after all the excitement and when the dust has settled where the road is to go will be settled back in Wall street" Williams concluded.
