Interested in the most impressive rodeo ever staged in Klamath county, bull-doggers and buckaroos, broncho busters and bare-back riders are coming from the north, the east, the south, and a few from what is left to be west, to try their luck in the belts offered in the 1925 rodeo as it will be staged July 2 to July 4, inclusive.

Among those who will probably appear in the field, or on the track, are Ty Stokes, bull-dogger; Bob Hall of Los Angeles, who will enter the bucking contest; Buddy Sterling of Pendleton and Cheyenne round-ups; the famous Montana Red Tate, and numerous others whose sombreros and high heels will soon be heard clicking on the streets of Klamath Falls as they train for the meet.

Ray Bell and Buddy Sterling, the latter a trick rider, have taken money at Pendleton round-ups, Cheyenne round-ups and at an eastern affair held in New York several years ago.

Perry Ivory, who has starred in London, as well as in New York, in Alturas as well as Cheyenne, and throughout all sections of the coast, will add to the rodeo with his presence when he has signed up to ride.

FRONTIER DAYS TO BE RE-ENACTED THIS WEEK IN KLAMATH'S BIGGER AND BETTER RODEO AT FAIRGROUND

Klamath Is Logical Place For A Rodeo Of World Wide Fame, And May Have One Of That Calibre In Future; Merchants Cooperating This Year As Never Before

Following sixty days' planning and preparations, the drama of the old west is to be re-enacted at Klamath Falls again this year on July 2, 3 and 4, when the picked men and women riders of the last great range gather here to pit their skill against the wildest steers and the most stubborn outlaw horses the bunch-grass land can produce.

At Klamath Falls the setting is ideal for such a review of the glory of the riders of the old range. Bordering a cattle country which extends across southeastern Oregon and northern California into Nevada, the most sparsely populated country in the union, Klamath's location for such a show may be considered superior to Pendleton, among the wheat fields of Umatilla, and Cheyenne, among the intensified farming operations of Wyoming.

Pendleton and Cheyenne have built up western shows of national magnitude through the undying enthusiasm of the citizens of their communities, backed by the perseverance and vision of a few men who could plan ahead and work out in faultless detail the re-staging of a picture with all the romance, dash, and thrill that was displayed in the winning of the west. And their greatness has been achieved with the addition of one great factor—advertising.

In Klamath county a few years ago, a little group of hard-riding, old-time cattlemen from the little community of Bly, on the headwaters of the Sprague river, conceived the
