

MANY HISTORIC POINTS VISITED

With Ed Howie's smooth performing Chrysler as pilot car. The Klamath News' first weekly "acrobatic" tour made an interesting 135-mile loop trip around the lava beds country Sunday. Captain O. C. Applegate acting as historian and guide.

The points visited were the famous pioneers' stone bridge on Lost river below Merrill, Bloody Point, where an entire train of emigrants were massacred by the Indians in 1853, the Indian petroglyphs on the cliffs in the lower end of Tule lake, Fremont's camp on the shore of Tule lake in 1843, and the following interesting points in the lava beds proper, Mammoth cave, the Indian well, Bear's Paw cave, the Ice cave, and the volcano chimneys in the little conical buttes bordering the lava country.

Whole Wood River Joins Cattle Assn.

Better Cattle Marketing Plan Meeting Success; Bly Meeting Today

Practically all of the 25 ranchers and cattle growers of the Wood river valley voted unanimously to join the orderly marketing system following a meeting with H. M. Rice of San Francisco, secretary of the California Cattle Growers' association, who is in Klamath county in the interest of signing up Klamath county cattlemen or shippers to the San Francisco market, to prevent a surplus of stock.

Today at Bly a meeting is scheduled, and prominent ranchers have signified their interest in the system. Among those who will be present to hear Mr. Rice on the subject, are Jim Givans of Bly, L. C. Siamore of Fort Klamath, and J. L. Beckley of Klamath Falls.

Thursday afternoon in the Hall hotel, Rice will discuss the question with those who were unable to attend the past meetings.

C. E. BADGER DIES OF HEART FAILURE

Called by the sudden death of her father, C. E. Badger, Mrs. B. G. Harding and Mr. Harding arrived in Klamath Falls from their home in Medford last night in order to accompany the body to Medford for burial.

Mr. Badger, who was owner of the barber shop in the Pastime pool hall passed away Saturday night or early Sunday morning from heart failure. He lived at the Baldwin residence and his body was not found until late Sunday night when occupants of the house became uneasy.

Mrs. Harding lost her mother six months ago in Texas and brought her father west to make his home with them. Badger operated his own business in Klamath Falls. He appeared in apparent good health last week when Mr. and Mrs. Harding were in the city on a visit with him.

ASHLAND IS ON AIR MAIL ROUTE

WASHINGTON, June 29.—Bids for eight new contract air mail routes have been called for by the postoffice department, this being the greatest expansion in the history of the air mail. The new routes are as follows:

Boston to New York via Hartford, Conn. Minneapolis and St. Paul to Chicago via LaCrosse, Wis. Birmingham, Ala., to Chicago, via Nashville, Louisville and Indianapolis.

St. Louis to Chicago via Springfield, Ill.

Port Worth and Dallas, Texas, to Chicago, via Oklahoma City and Wichita, Kas.; Kansas City and St. Joseph, Mo., and Moline, Ill.

Los Angeles, to Salt Lake via Las Vegas, N. B.

Pasco, Wash., to Elko, Nevada, via Boise, Idaho.

Los Angeles to Seattle, via Bakersfield, Fresno, San Francisco and Sacramento, Calif., and Ashland and Portland, Ore.

Postage will be ten cents an ounce on each route not over 1,000 miles, and 15 cents up to 1,500 miles, with 5 cents additional for each zone travelled on the transcontinental government operated route.

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NAVY SHIPS ARE RUSHED TO S. B.

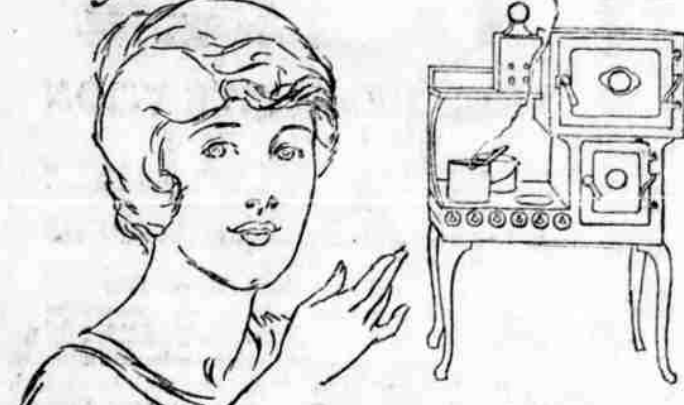
