

# Pelicans Make 8 Bobbles And Lose Crucial Game To Yreka

## LOCALS PILE UP 3 RUN LEAD IN SIXTH ONLY TO LOSE OUT AFTER MOHLER BLOWS UP WHEN INJURED

**Pelicans Knock Two Yreka Pitchers Out In Series Of Battering Rampages, But Play Miserable Game In Field; Doc Noel Gets Home Run With One On**

Some nineteen hundred odd ball fans, including a delegation of nearly 300 Yrekans, gathered at the fair grounds Sunday afternoon to see a crucial game, between two teams battling for leadership in the Siskiyou-Klamath league. Conservative estimates place the score at 16 to 13 after the ninth stanza was over, although runs and hits came in such deluges that it is considered highly probable that several hits and runs slipped by the official scorers.

Errors? Well, the Pelicans led the league in fielding until Sunday. Now they are at the bottom. If they ain't, they oughta be. Eight were chalked up and it was with the greatest leniency that the scorekeepers didn't add about a dozen more.

Hits? Well, neither team need be ashamed of their stick work. Mohler was nicked for just 20 safeties. Three Yreka hurlers, and the Pelicans do have the satisfaction of sending both Metten and Cunningham to the showers, were touched for 18.

**Yrekans Lucky**  
Yreka ball players left here rather bewildered, Sunday night. They haven't quite found out just how they did get away with a win. But they did, and Klamath Falls was forced to give up its tie hold on first position and be contented with a second berth until the next league game, a week from next Sunday.

It wouldn't have been such a hard game to lose, had not the Pelicans come from behind after the Yrekans had led by an 8 to 1 score for 6 innings and taken the lead by a 11 to 8 score themselves, only to lose out when Mohler went to pieces after being beamed in the kidneys by the third and last Yreka hurler, Edy. Mohler was knocked cookoo while at bat in the last of the sixth, and after that every Yrekan was free to hit as often and as hard as he chose.

**No Relief Pitcher**  
Why another hurler wasn't sent in to relieve Mohler has not been explained. It developed, however, that there were just 9 Pelicans in a uniform.

The Yrekans started out in the first inning to win. Six hits and a couple of errors netted them five tallies in the first stanza. They lacked just one man of batting around. Three hits and one error netted them more runs in the second.

The Pelicans scored a lone tally in the first when Norwest singled and Watts doubled. For the next two innings they went out in one, two, three order. But Metten was doomed. In the fourth they climbed his frame for three hits and two runs. In the fifth they got four hits and two runs.

**Metten In Hot Water**  
Metten got the can tied to him in this fifth, when with no down a young high school boy by the name of Cunningham was rushed into action. Cunningham confronted himself with the ticklish predicament of filling the bases with no Pelicans out. And the youngster got away lucky at that. Not a run could be pushed across with the bases loaded and none out.

In the sixth the Pelicans socked out five hits for six runs. That slaughter was something fierce and when the chapter closed the Pelicans were in the lead 11 to 8. But in that inning the boomerang occurred. Edy, the Yreka pitcher hit Mohler in the kidneys with a speed ball that knocked the game Pelican hurler cookoo for three minutes. Edy even neglected to say he was sorry after Mohler was revived.

**Game Thrown Away**  
And Mohler was a beaten man after that. The Yrekans shoved four runs across in the seventh, two in the eighth and two in the ninth.

In their last half of the ninth, ed their usual rill the Pelicans with two down, showed their usual rallying spirit. But it was feeble. The five run lead was too much to overcome. Three bunched hits however, brought in two runs and the game ended 16 to 13, when Bayness sent a long fly into right field.

### Pittsburg Pirates Oust Giants From First Place In National League Race

Brooklyn Move Into Third Place When Dazy Vance Brilliant Hurling Defeats Braves; Giants Rained Out And Have No Alternative But Second Place

PITTSBURGH, June 29.—(United News)—The mighty Giants, habitual champions of the National league, and occasional world series champions, tumbled out of first place today for the first time since the eight clubs straightened out in the run toward October. The Giants were idle because of rain in New York, and the Pittsburgh Pirates, who had drawn up close while the Giants were floundering on their recent tour, won a game from the Reds in Cincinnati, 8 to 1. That gave Pittsburgh a percentage of .619 to the Giants' mark of .615. There is less than half a game between them, but nevertheless, the Giants, who haven't been dislodged from the top of the league more than a half dozen times in three years, are now second to the team which has been almost a constant challenger since 1922.

The Giants and Braves started their game at the Polo Grounds, but were rained out after two innings, with the Giants leading 1 to 0. In the other game in the National league, the Dodgers broke out their humiliating tie with the Reds for third place. The talented arm of Dazy Vance won for the Dodgers over the Phillies. It was Vance's fourth win in four starts, and struck out six hitters, bringing total for the season thus far to 21 strike-outs.
