

Washington Leads American League Through Yesterday's Win

WALTER JOHNSON HURLS BRILLIANT BALL, BLANKING THE ATHLETICS IN CRUCIAL GAME; ALLOWS BUT 2 HITS

Slugging Lamar of Athletics Who Had Hit Safely in 29 Consecutive Games Fails To Kick Through Yesterday; Pirates Are Still Leading National

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(United News)—Pitching one of the most brilliant games of his long career, Walter Johnson shut out the Athletics 7 to 0, allowing only two hits. This put Washington at the head of the American league.

This is the first time this year, except for the first few days of the season, that the world champions have been in first place.

They went into the last game of the present series with the Athletics just half a game from the top. Walter Johnson, for all of his 18 years in the big league, pitched a game that came within a hair of his great "no hit, no run game" with the Boston Red Sox years ago.

He let only two men reach first. Galloway made it in the sixth, when Peck was slow in handling a hot grounder. The scorer gave Galloway a hit, although in the same inning, Peck handled the same kind of a ball for an out. Then in the ninth inning, a pinch hitter, French, banded out another base hit. He was second man to make first base in the whole game.

Washington fans, who turned out for the game by thousands, were as wildly jubilant over Johnson's heroic pitching as they were over the return of the home team to first place after lagging behind since the start. Just before he went to New England, President Coolidge presented Johnson with the diploma certifying him as the most valuable player last season.

In addition to pitching his team into first place, Johnson stopped the remarkable hitting streak of Lamar, who until today, he had hit safely 29 consecutive games.

Pittsburgh Still Leads
The situation at the top of the National league remained the same. Both the Giants and the Pirates lost their games, thus giving the Pittsburgh team another day as league leaders. Brooklyn holding third place in the league standing, also lost, thus completing the defeat of the top trio by three teams with the poorest records.

New York lost to the Braves 2 to 3, the Dodgers to the Phillies 9 to 10, and the Pirates were shut out by Chicago, 1 to 0.
Cincinnati and St. Louis were not scheduled to play.
