SPORTS DONE BROWN

Wid' Mathews, rated a year or so ago as one of the most promising young outfielders in the game, may never reach the dizzy heights selected as a leading place for him. But he will have done considerable traveling and travel is broadening, the K. S. circulars say. Mathews, at this writing, is with the Indianapolis club. He was sold outright to that club the other day by Washington. While Mathews has ridden around the American Association circuit and knows the tall buildings in the Indiana metropolis, he had never seen most of the suburbs. When Griffith grabbed Mathews from Milwaukee two years ago, the Old Man held out great hopes for him. Mathews started out like a house afire. Fielded like a natural born ballhawk and hit sensationally. First he hitting fell off and then, when Griff attempted to get him going on the right track the young man failed to take kindly to the suggestions made. Last season Griff, grasping for players who might help his team carry on to its first pennant, got a chance to grasp Earl McNeely from the Pacific Coast. The Sacramento club, however, demanded something in the way of an outfielder in exchange, and Griff sent them Mathews. The move was questioned by the Washington fans and scribes—until McNeely asked that base hit in the twelfth inning of the final game of the world's series. Mathews should prove a star with Donnie Bush's team. And in the eternal quest of big league clubs for strengthening and new material he's liable to get a few more sight-seeing tours. While Walter Johnson hasn't been called upon to play iron man with the Senators so far this season, he has turned in a goodly number of victories. Without those victories the Senators would not now be out ahead of the pack, fighting it out with the Athletics for the lead. All of which causes one to wonder how often Clark Griffith, Stan Harris and Washington in general thank their lucky stars that King Walter failed to land a franchise in the Pacific Coast League. The man who has fanned more ball players than either the great old Cy Young or the beloved Christy Mathewson seems as good as he was last season. And he carried the team to a pennant that hectic year. Wait, at last reports, was fighting it out with Sammy Gray for the honor of leading in winning percentage. The dope is that Johnson is receiving a salary of \$25,000 for this season. If his patching spells the difference between another pennant and losing the one the team now boasts, he will be worth twice that much to the Washington owners. Walter Johnson still deserves the title of King.
