ROCKEFELLER IN BAD WITH UNION MINERS

NEW YORK, July 2.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., Wednesday night answered charges of bad faith by John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, making public voluminous correspondence which reiterated his argument of coal operators that they cannot afford to operate their mines on the union wage scale in competition with the non-union mines in West Virginia.

Lewis declared in a speech at Scranton, Pa., that the Consolidation Coal company of West Virginia in which Rockefeller is a stockholder, has repudiated its wage agreement with the union workers "in violation of commercial obligation and business honor."
