ENGLAND FACES A COAL STRIKE

LONDON, July 3.—England's sick industry is threatened with a strike of 1,000,000 coal miners. Simultaneously railway workers are negotiating the delicate matter of wage reductions to affect all classes of employees from directors down, and an isolated strike among suburban lines employees already has been declared.

Miners' delegates rejected the latest peace offer of the operators Friday, but this rejection does not necessitate an immediate strike, as it is expected that the government would intervene before permitting the dispute to reach the down-tools stage. The owners had offered to pay all the expenses of the miners from the proceeds and to divide the remainder between salary and profit.

87 per cent for salary and 13 per cent for profit.

The miners' refusal of the proposal increases the national anxiety and marks the first step toward what is expected to be a general labor crisis. About three weeks is estimated as the period required before the situation will have reached its crucial stage, whereupon government action probably would be necessary to avert a mine strike, and probably a strike of transport workers.

A special trade union congress convenes July 24 to discuss the situation, and this meeting is expected to coincide with serious developments between employers and employees. Already the more radical of the labor men in the house of commons have begun to reflect the heat of their constituents.
