WASHINGTON, July 6.—The way has been opened again for Henry Ford to bid for government ships, and make good the opportunity he lost recently when his offer for 200 ships for scrapping went astray in the mails.

Leigh Palmer, president of the emergency fleet corporation, sent out a letter Monday to shipping operators in the United States, including Ford, urging bids for ships now held by the shipping board.

This general campaign by Palmer is regarded as an intensive effort to get as much of the government's merchant fleet as possible back into private hands. By placing the initiative for bids in hands of ship operators and giving them wide latitude in their offers as to number and type of vessel, it will be possible to awaken more interest among possible purchasers.

SECRETARY WORK MAY NOT ATTEND SALEM MEETING

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6.—(United News)—Plans for conferences in Salem and Portland Tuesday with Hubert Work, secretary of the Interior and Dr. Elwood Mead, director of reclamation, were completely upset Monday night by the receipt of a brief word that the two government officials would not be here on the schedule previously announced. In fact, the rather obscure messages that came from Seattle, where the secretary was Monday, indicated that he might not leave the Puget Sound city before tonight.

Dr. Work and his party were scheduled to arrive here at 6:45 a. m., Tuesday, and to leave two hours later for Salem, there to meet with Governor Pierce and the state security commission concerning state aid for irrigation. They were to return from the state capital Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock to meet the executive committee of the Umatilla rapids project and confer with representatives of Deschutes irrigation projects.

Thursday and Friday they were scheduled to inspect the Baker, Owyhee and Vale projects.

Word from Seattle late Monday was to the effect that the pressure of business in connection with Washington irrigation matters was much greater than had been expected, and that the party could not leave as formerly planned. This information came direct from Dr. Work, it was stated, although other members of the party are said to have sent word to Portland that the delegation would arrive here some time Tuesday.

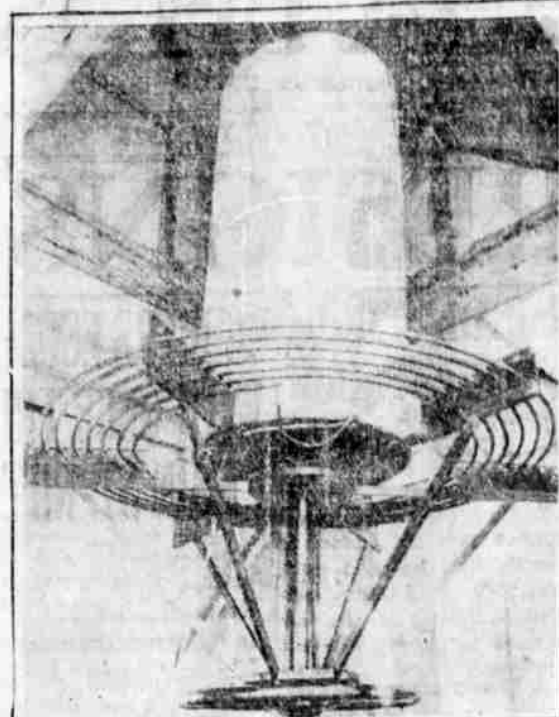
