

IT'S NOT WHAT YOU DO BUT HOW YOU DO IT, IS OPINION OF C. E. WITH REGARD TO AMUSEMENTS

PORTLAND, July 6.—(United News)—It's not so much what you do as how you do it that counts.

That appeared to be the general sentiment at the open forum on amusement, a feature of the International Christian Endeavor convention here Monday afternoon. It was definitely agreed, however, that a few amusements are wholly bad—including gambling, prize fighting and drinking intoxicating liquors.

To the "twilight zone" for future discussion were relegated pastimes that had divided support, and were not above some reproach. They included:

Dancing; card playing; Sunday amusements; movies; theatres.

Dancing drew much of the comment from thousands of delegates jammed in the auditorium.

"Can a dancing foot and a praying knee go together? Did you ever see a dancing person, who is pious?" asked one young man, whose identity was unlearned.

Opinion Differs

A discord of "yeas" and "noes" swept through the house.

A more open minded girl then took the floor and declared she believed in home dancing, but not in public dancing.

"The people of our town think dancing is all right when it is watched," she said.

"Why should it have to be watch-

ed?" inquired a voice from the floor. The moderates gained more ground when a delegate, whose speech indicated he was from Dixie, won applause with:

"We cannot lay down any rule. Christianity is a spiritual and not a mechanical religion. We must determine whether an amusement adds anything worth while to our life."

Passion Outlets?

Another youth then got to the floor and suggested dancing is merely "a rhythm within the human." He pointed to African tribal dances as proof. A negro lad arose and retorted that the dances of his forefathers were pagan and were designed to arouse the passions.

"As Christians we should not allow our passions to take control of our bodies," he said.

In regard to Sunday amusements, one young woman declared it was her opinion that it would be better to play golf or tennis on Sunday than to read a poor book. Her suggestion met with divided response.

Movies on Sundays are worse than movies on week days, it was generally agreed. There are good and bad movies, and good and bad shows on the stage.

Popular approval picked out several activities as above reproach. Among these were unprofessional athletics, fishing, home and church social games, educational films, pageantry and "good" reading.

Hall of Fame Election Enlists Wide-Spread Popular Interest

Wisconsin State Legislature asks Honor for Inventor of the Typewriter.

WILL future elections to the Hall of Fame be attended by a nation-wide, popular interest similar to that displayed in our Presidential elections?

Is this non-political institution becoming at last the medium through which may be expressed popular appreciation of the distinguished services of those whose work is finished?

A marked trend in that direction has just been disclosed at New York University, where the Hall of Fame stands, in connection with the five-year election which is to be held this year. In particular the growing national interest in the election of one of the candidates has been evidenced by recent action of the Legislature of the State of Wisconsin.

The State Senate of Wisconsin has unanimously passed a resolution which was subsequently adopted unanimously by the Assembly, appealing to the electors of "the American Hall of Fame to honor the name of Christopher Latham Sholes."

The resolution asks this honor for a native son because, it reads, he "gave to the world one of its greatest inventions, the typewriter, which has been of incalculable value to industrial, business and social life."

This official endorsement by a State of the Union, of the candidacy of "the father of the typewriter" follows similar action by several national and local organizations, among them the National Shorthand Reporters' Association, which has

recently appointed a committee to further the candidacy; the National Commercial Teachers' Federation, the Herkimer County (N. Y.) Historical Society and the Milwaukee Association of Commerce.

The popular interest in the candidacy of Sholes, whose invention was first given to the world in practical form by the Remingtons at Ilion, Herkimer Co., N. Y., fifty-two years ago, has been further stimulated by the recent action of Thomas A. Edison who is numbered among his nominators.

The election will be held next November. Nominations closed on March 15.

IDAHO COWBOY CHAMP BUCKER IN K. F. RODEO

Amid a flurry of bucking, trick riding and spectacular races the Bly Rodeo association wound up its 1925 performance on the fair grounds field Saturday afternoon.

Throughout the three day performance, the lithe and active figure of Lorena Trickey of Prineville proved to be the big drawing card. It was her string of horses that won the sensational women's relay race; and she placed first in the Roman half mile race on Saturday and also the five-eighth mile running race and half mile running race.

Cash Is Champion

Guy Cash of Grangeville, Idaho, riding Snappy John won the bucking contest. Red Shepherd of Helena, Calif., on Black Demon came in second; Ross Richardson of Pazzoley on Hot Dam, won third; and Billy Raymond of Dorris, Calif., on Freckles drew a fourth.

Guy Cash was awarded the banner of being the best all around cow boy during the rodeo, with 43 points to his credit. Bill Perkins drew second place with 35 points.

Roping Champ

B. Perkins, who is foreman of the Alexander ranch near Eagle Ridge, won first prize in the roping contest, with George Fletcher of Pendleton second and Dallas Givans of Bly third.

Sid Steele, with his string of horses won the men's relay, one and a half miles, in the jig time of 3.23. The Silvers string was second. G. D. Givans nosed out E. B. Henry in the chariot race of one half mile, making the distance in one minute.

From a financial standpoint the rodeo has proved to be the most successful ever staged in Klamath Falls, according to announcement yesterday morning the association will break a little better than even, due to the presence of nearly 7,000 people at the show Saturday. In the past, the rodeo has finished the three day performance, slightly on the red side of the ledger.

Man Mysteriously Hurt Is Recovering Slowly In Hospital

Bill Kelly, who was found unconscious near 7th and Main streets by a telephone girl returning from work early in the morning Sunday, was slowly recovering at the Klamath General hospital late last night.

How he was injured Kelly himself apparently does not know. He was said to be intoxicated at the time, and cannot tell whether he was slugged or was run over by an automobile. Kelly received severe scalp wounds and bruises about the body.

Little is known of Kelly. He is said to be a sheepman working for Hacketts.

NEW COMMANDER ON RIFF FRONT

PARIS, July 6.—General Guillauman, selected by Premier Painleve to succeed Marshal Lyautey as commander of the French army, opposing Abd El Krim's Riffians in Morocco, has refused the appointment. Another selection is to be announced immediately.

FEZ, French Morocco, July 6.—Native women and children have been ordered to evacuate Taza as a precaution against possible capture of that city by the Riffians, who continue to filter through the French lines in large numbers.

Groups of women and children began to leave Taza Monday night. The evacuation was being conducted in a most orderly fashion. The men remained in the city.

MANY VIOLATE TRAFFIC LAWS

The traffic laws were roughly handled over the holidays, but the offenders in turn received the rough dry treatment from the enforcement officers. Fourteen motorists were arrested by Traffic Officer Knowles and received fines totalling \$120.50.

S. Crawford was fined \$13.50 for speeding, reckless driving, passing on intersections and driving without an operator's card.

Vall C. Curry paid \$10 and costs for speeding and a similar sum, given as bail by Harry Glupe, when arrested on a charge of speeding, was forfeited when he failed to appear for hearing.

Kirk Mitchell and H. M. Lewis paid \$5.50 each for the privilege of parking on the highway.

C. F. Greer, scheduled for hearing on a charge of reckless driving, failed to appear.

L. Z. Carter was fined \$13.50 for speeding and driving without an operator's card. Claude Jean donated the same amount for reckless driving and for his failure to carry an operator's license.

C. Bunce, arrested for speeding, was granted a postponement of hearing till tomorrow, and L. L. Strong, arraigned for speeding in a truck, was fined \$13.50.

Three motorists, with an insufficient array of lights also became personally acquainted with Officer Knowles, McKinley Jackson, running without lights or an operator's card, was fined \$13.50. J. W. Schroder, who neglected to dim and whose car was shy a tail light, drew a \$5.50 fine.

L. F. Lamb, driving without any lights at all and also without an operator's card, appeared for hearing in Bonanza.

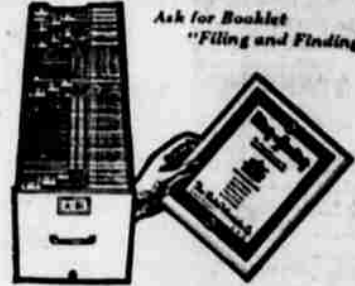
