BIG PRIZES TO BE GIVEN LOCAL POTATO RAISERS

As the fast rubber band was slipped in place about the huge roll of printer's copy for the premium list of the coming county fair, Henry Semon, the energetic president of the Klamath Potato Growers' association, bounded into the office of the county fair board.

"Am I in time?" he panted. "Sell your future crop at 6c or did they strike oil on your place?" someone queried.

Hank, as he is affectionally termed by his immediate associates, displayed the famous Semon grin. "Nope. Something better than that. The American National bank is offering a second prize for the commercial potato exhibit at the fair at \$25 cash, and J. S. Mills & Son came in with a third prize of \$20 cash. What with J. W. Kerns' first prize of a \$145 Iron Age potato planter, and these second and third cash prizes, there's going to be more fine potatoes raised and shown in Klamath county this year than anyone ever dreamed of. Isn't that enough to set any potato grower to hoeing and hilling?"

Mr. Semon, besides being the ring-leader of the local growers' association, is one of the largest raisers of netted gems in the Klamath basin, and superintendent of the newly created potato division at the county fair. This year will be the first that potatoes have formed an exclusive exhibit and been allotted sufficient space to properly display one of the county's most important and remunerative commercial crops. One of the outstanding attractions of this exhibit will be the netted gems display by commercial producers, raising two or more acres. The prize-winning sacks will be auctioned at the close of the fair, and proceeds revert to a revolving fund for the furtherance of potato awards and displays at succeeding fairs. With the adoption of improved methods of cultivation, irrigation, field selection and careful grading practiced this year, Mr. Semon hopes to assemble a display of potatoes that would make any county envious.

General Motors Buys A Big Slice Of Yellow Cab

CHICAGO, July 7.—Arrangements have been concluded whereby the Yellow Cab, truck and motor coach manufacturing properties, will become a part of the \$500,000,000 General Motors corporation, according to an announcement Tuesday by John Hertz, president of the Yellow Cab Manufacturing company.

The General Motors corporation will purchase a controlling interest in the Yellow Cab Manufacturing company for approximately 16,000,000, according to the announcement. A new corporation will be formed, to be known as the Yellow Truck and Coach Manufacturing company.

American Play Barred From London's Stage

LONDON, July 7.—(United News) "The Harum," an American play, which even interested New York last season because of the frankness of its dialogue and plot, has been barred from the London stage.

The Lord Chamberlain's office, which acts as the official censor here, has refused to license the play. One of the officials said the "plot was objectionable, the dialogue nasty, and the whole atmosphere salacious."

Miss Lenore Ulrich was the star of the play in New York. It was produced by David Belasco.

THOUSANDS AT DEDICATION OF COPCO 2 PLANT

More than 2,000 persons made the trip to Copco No. 2, on the Klamath river, Sunday, to attend the dedication of the new hydro electric power plant which will be put into operation in the near future by the California-Oregon Power company.

The entire project, completed at a cost of more than \$2,000,000, taking more than a year to complete, and which will develop 37,000 horsepower in electrical energy, was thrown open to the public for inspection. Guides were on hand to escort parties over the

works, and instead of the usual formal speaking program, the day was given over to trips of inspection, a short talk, and a picnic luncheon.

The giant wood stave pipe, 16 feet in diameter, the largest wood stave pipe in the world, attracted the attention of the crowd, and almost every visitor walked through the quarter mile of the pipe. Many walked through the tunnel, while almost every one inspected the new power plant.

In the only speech of the day, John H. McKee, vice-president of the company said:

"One short year ago work started on the this great project which

we are to dedicate this day to public service.

"This is not to be a day of speeches. It is our purpose to place before you symbolically the human ideals and efforts which have contributed to bring about this splendid achievement and then to enable you to see for yourselves the results."

"The tunnels and pipe lines are free of water and you are cordially invited to inspect the work inside and out."

"And of you in this great assemblage gathered here today to inspect this great achievement represent that great public which Copco serves, and for the purpose of our little ceremonial I am go-

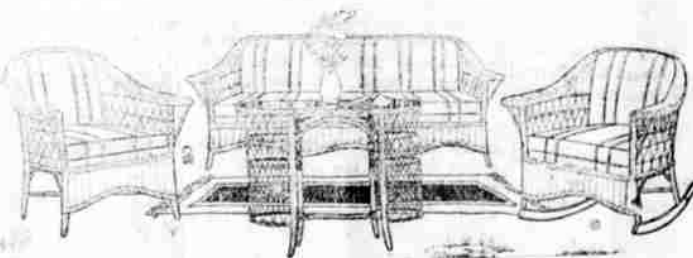
