

GIANT ROOKIE USED BY MCGRAW IN FIRST GAME OF PITTSBURGH SERIES

Pittsburgh Remains In Lead By Margin Of Only One Full Game; Senators Slip A Notch By Losing Hard Fought Game To White Sox 2-1

POLO GROUNDS, NEW YORK, July 7.—(United News)—Kent Greenfield, who is spending his first year in the National league, was elected by John McGraw, today to supply the wedge that would pry the Pirates loose from their position at the top of the league. It was a little unusual for the Giants' foreman to risk such an important game by placing a youngster on the mound, but Greenfield has worked well in the past against the Pittsburgh team. He worked well again today, and as a result, the Pirates are just one full game ahead of the New Yorkers, who tossed out a 7 to 6 victory in the last of the eighth inning. The Giants' victory gave them their third win out of eight times they have faced the western team. There are four games left in the present series, at the end of which time, the league leadership, for the present at least, will have been decided.

The Cardinals' position at fourth place was weakened considerably by Boston in the double program in

which St. Louis suffered two defeats. The first game went to Boston 7 to 4, and the second 8 to 2. The Dodgers, holders of third place, were also hard pressed. They lost to the Cubs, 10 to 5.

The Phils and Reds split a double header in Philadelphia. Donohue shut out the Philadelphia 4 to 0 in the first game, but in the second, Cincinnati lost 4 to 3.

The Senators lost some of their lead over the Athletics by dropping a game to the White Sox in Chicago 2 to 1. Lyons, pitching for the Sox, allowed only five hits, and fanned Bluege in the ninth, with the tying run on second and two outs.

The games between Boston and Detroit and Philadelphia and Cleveland were postponed on account of rain.

The Yankees dropped to seventh place and the Browns advanced to a tie with the Tigers in fourth place, as a result of a complete victory for the St. Louis team in a double kill. The Browns won their first game 12 to 3 and the second by the narrower margin of 6 to 5.

The New York Yankees have several times given striking evidences of what a team of stars can do when the members seek personal glory above team success.

Last spring, while the Detroit Tigers and Toronto, with which the Tigers have a working agreement, were training at Augusta, Ga., Manager Dan Howley, Toronto boss, had

Rabbit Maranville To Assume Role of New Cubs' Skipper

Bill Killefer Given His Release For Failure To Make A Winning Team

NEW YORK, July 7.—Rabbit Maranville, the star National league infielder became the third, new manager in the National league this season, when he was appointed to succeed Bill Killefer as pilot of the Chicago Cubs.

The Rabbit, whose appointment is supposed to be due to the poor showing the Cubs have made this year, took charge of the team just before it played the Brooklyn Robins Tuesday at Ebbits field.

He shook up the line-up at once and sent Grigsby and Tommy Griffith, a couple of veterans into the outfield, where they replaced two recruits, Brooks and Jahn.

Then Maranville, who shone first in Boston and went to Chicago from Pittsburgh in the Grantham-Albright-Grinn deal, fumbled the first ball hit to him after the game opened, indicating that the cares and worries of a manager might already be beginning to affect him.

Killefer was paid up to the end of the year and released outright by William Wrigley, Jr., owner of the Cubs, Catalina Island and most of the chewing gum. He will now go to Philadelphia to break the glad news to his wife who is in a hospital there and then to his home in PawPaw, Mich. Killefer succeeded Johnny Evers with the Chicago team, and at the end of August would have served three full years.

In addition to Maranville, the other new National league managers are Rogers Hornsby of the St. Louis Cards and Zach Wheat of the Robins, whose appointment is only temporary.

Like Hornsby and Wheat, Maranville will continue in the line-up.

Sid Terris To Fight It Out With Hudkins

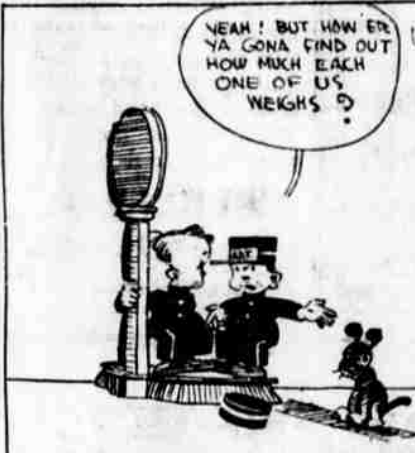
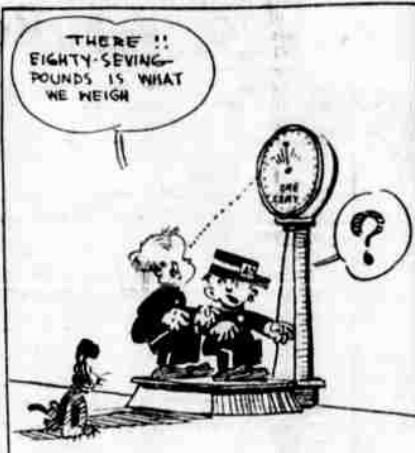
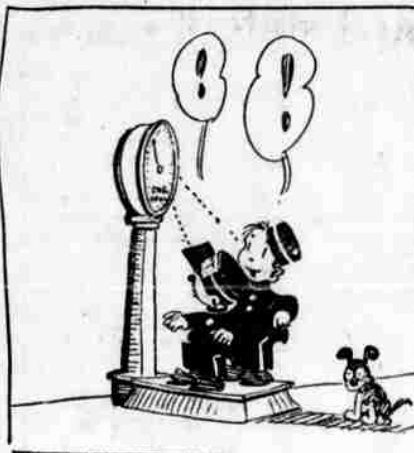
