FRANCE ORDERS INCREASED NAVY

PARIS, July 7.—The French attitude toward further naval disarmament may have been reflected in the senate's adoption Tuesday night of a project which will open credits for execution of the naval program recommended by the marine commission. The proposal passed by a large majority.

The new program provides for construction of a cruiser of 10,000 tons, three torpedo destroyers of 2500 ton each; four torpedo boats of 400 tons; seven submarines of 1500 tons; two submarine mine layers, one surface mine layer and an aviation transport.

The spokesman for the marine commission said these units would still leave the navy in an inferior position. Urging that France must have a strong navy, he pointed out that she had fallen to fourth position among the naval powers.
