### PROTECT THE FORESTS

Fires are already breaking out in the hills. The duty to sow no seeds of fire is on everyone. It falls particularly on the vacationists now swarming the woods. The experienced outdoor man grinds tobacco leavings and match stubs into the dust with his heel.

The campfire should be built only on bare ground, should never be left unattended, and should be thoroughly extinguished before the camp is left. The forests will be open as long as the public respects the rules for safeguarding them, otherwise they will eventually be closed during the summer to protect our timber resources.

### CUTTING OUT OFFICIAL POMP

It has been a common statement that in public affairs two employees are usually hired, where one would be required to do the work in private affairs. President Coolidge has shown a determination to change this method of doing public business if he possibly can. He has decided to dispense with the services of the White House Social Secretary and turn this work over to some man in the state department service. This means that a man in the state department will have to assume the additional responsibility of directing the conduct of all formal social functions at the White House instead of being merely an advisor in regards to them as in the past. It has been suggested that the man on whom this additional duty will fall is likely to resign. It is a safe bet, however, that he will not resign. If the people want economy in public affairs they must back public officials who have the courage to cut out red tape and public pomp even though it causes someone to lose a job on the public payroll.

### GREATEST EMPLOYER AND TAXPAYER

During 1924, Class 1 railroads of the United States paid out \$4,847,700,000 for wages, materials, supplies and improvements.

This does not include approximately \$340,000,000 paid by the railroads in taxes, the \$510,000,000 which they paid out in interest charges nor dividends amounting to \$310,000,000.

A large part of this sum went directly to the industries of our country, through which source it reached the wage earners, thereby contributing, to a large extent, to the prosperity which was enjoyed in 1924.

#### TODAY'S RECIPES.

Apple, Celery and Raisin Salad—  
 Two cups diced apples, one-half cup  
 chopped celery, one-half cup nuts,  
 one-half cup seedless raisins. Ar-  
 range on lettuce and serve with  
 mayonnaise.

Corn Pudding—One can corn,  
 two eggs, two tablespoons melted  
 butter, two cups milk, one-half tea-  
 spoon salt. Stir all together and  
 bake in moderate oven.

Junket—Take one quart milk,  
 one junket tablet, one-quarter cup  
 sugar, one teaspoon vanilla.  
 Heat milk in double boiler until  
 lukewarm, add crushed junket  
 tablet, sugar and vanilla, stir until  
 dissolved, pour into dish in warm  
 place to thicken then set in cool  
 place.

#### SUGGESTIONS.

To remove fruit stains, first be-  
 sure that the surface on which you  
 are going to work with your linen  
 or other material is absolutely  
 clean, so no other spots or stains  
 may be gathered while you are  
 working. Have a large bowl ready  
 and plenty of boiling water.  
 Spread the stained article over the  
 bowl and pour boiling water  
 through it until the stain disappears.

#### JELLIED BERRIES.

'Crush sufficient berries to  
 make two cupsful of pulp.  
 Sweeten to taste. Soak two  
 tablespoonsful gelatin in one-  
 half cupful of cold water, then  
 set it in a bowl of boiling water  
 until dissolved. Stir into  
 crushed fruit until it begins to  
 set.

pears. This method is usually  
 successful, except sometimes in  
 the case of peach stain. Then if  
 the stain is stubborn and the boil-  
 ing water has not entirely removed  
 it, soak the spot either in Javelle  
 water for a short time, or in a  
 weak solution of oxalic acid. Then,  
 of course, you must be sure and  
 rinse thoroughly the material, so  
 the chemical will not injure it.  
 Sometimes pear stains will not  
 yield to the boiling water treatment  
 and a chemical must be used.  
 Javelle water is made as follows:

One pound sal soda, one-half pound  
 chloride of lime, one quart hot  
 water, two quarts cold water. Dis-  
 solve the sal soda in the quart of  
 boiling water. Put the chloride of  
 lime in the cold water, allow the  
 mixture to settle, then pour the  
 clear liquid into the sal soda solu-  
 tion. Put in a tightly corked bottle  
 and keep in a dark place, for light  
 and air cause it to lose its strength.  
 When using, add an equal amount  
 of clear water to the portion of  
 Javelle water.

Do not forget that there are  
 other forms of sugar besides the  
 well-known cane sugar. For ex-  
 ample, milk sugar is very useful  
 in cases where it is necessary to  
 change the type of food for the  
 intestines. Malt sugar is also use-  
 ful especially in cases of constipa-  
 tion.

If a chicken is well rubbed inside  
 and out with a cut lemon leaf, it  
 will keep longer.
