

Pelicans Will Play Dunsmuir In Klamath Falls Sunday

GAME SCHEDULED TO BE PLAYED IN DUNSMUIR TRANSFERRED TO K. F. BY AGREEMENT WITH DUNSMUIR TEAM

Flashy New Second Baseman, McNeely, Will Be In Pelican Uniform; Klamath Team Anxious To Start Last Half Of Season Off With A Bang By A Victory; McCloud And Yreka To Battle Off Tie For Leadership

Telegraphic acceptance from Dunsmuir of a proposition tendered by the Klamath Falls club to play the game scheduled at Dunsmuir in Klamath Falls instead, was received yesterday by Manager Fred Glover of the Pelicans.

The Dunsmuir management were well satisfied with the treatment they received when they played here before, and are of the opinion that they could come out better financially by taking 75 per cent of the gate receipts here, and paying their own expenses to Klamath Falls.

With the season half over the Pelicans find themselves in the first division. Not so bad, considering that the Klamath Falls team is the only new club in the league this year. When the club was first organized last spring it had only a nucleus to work with. Since then, gradually, the team has been built up.

Bert Arnold and Doc Noel, who looked like misfits earlier in the season, are now valuable assets to the team. Booth, who was recently secured from Wood, is a big addition to the team with his timely hitting. Pitcher Street, who has been out of the game for quite some time, may be in a Pelican uniform Sunday. Street pitched for Roseburg July 4th and won his game. Mohler, however, will be started Sunday. "Lefty" pitched a masterful game against Grants Pass last Sunday, and if he is right in the Dunsmuir game the Pelicans, with their newly cemented weak spots, should enter the last half of the season a strong favorite for league leadership.

But the big drawing card of Sunday's game will be the new Pelican shortstop, McNeely. McNeely is about the sweetest infielder that ever came to Klamath Falls. He is fast on his feet, an ambitious ball player who goes after anything in his territory, and he usually handles the hot ones perfectly. He knows the game, and he keeps the whole infield "jazzed" up with his peppy work. McNeely is a terrific slugger, at least, that's the impression he made on local fans last Sunday when he knocked out the only home run of the game, a terrific drive that cleared the fence by almost 20 feet.

McNeely and Red Watts, who will probably play short, should prove a wonderful combination. Both of these players know the finesse of the game, and there should be some flashy teamwork on and about the keystone bag.

Again, Watts may be placed on third, and either Bayness or Norwest at short. Norwest and Bayness are two good men who should be kept in the lineup if possible. Norwest hasn't been playing up to standard on the defensive, but he is a reliable slugger. On the other hand, while Bayness has covered third in a masterful fashion he has failed to make a record for himself with the stick.

Mathews, Noel and Booth will no doubt adorn the outfield as usual. Of the Dunsmuir pitching staff—Wells, Hull and McBride, it is considered probable that Hull will take

Jimmy Goodrich To Fight Title Go In N. Y. With Chilean

NEW YORK, July 8.—(United News)—Jimmy Goodrich, the Buffalo lightweight, who won the American title in his class in the New York boxing commission's elimination tournament, has been ordered to New York to complete his training for his bout next Monday night with Stanislaus Loyaza of Chile, for the world's lightweight championship. Goodrich came through the lightweight tournament, in which all prominent 135 pounders were represented except Sid Terris. Loyaza knocked out Cliffin Ohana of Cuba in the foreign field. It is likely that the winner of the championship contest at Queensboro stadium will be matched with Terris. In the semi-final of ten rounds Eddie "Cannon Ball" Martin, former world's bantamweight champion, will meet Irish Johnny Curtin, of Jersey City.

SENATORS PULL AHEAD IN RACE WITH ATHLETICS

Stan Coveleskie Turns In Another Win For Harris' Team; Athletics Seem To Be Slipping

CHICAGO, July 8.—(United News)—The Senators won back the half game margin they lost to the Athletics Tuesday, by winning a freakish game from the White Sox in Chicago Wednesday. By virtue of the 10 to 2 victory which Stanley Coveleskie took for the Washington team, the world's champions now stand again two and one-half games above the Muckmen, who split a double-header with the Indians at Cleveland.

The first game at Cleveland was a dismal defeat for the Athletics, who made twice as many errors as runs. Piling up ten scores in the first inning, the Indians took the first contest 14 to 3. The second went to Philadelphia 7 to 5.

Babe Ruth helped to give the Yankees a victory, in St. Louis, after having two losses there Tuesday. With the Babe's homer, which scored Combs also, the Yankees won 6 to 4. The defeat threw the Browns back into fifth place from the tie for fourth which they held with Detroit Tuesday.

The Tigers, however, helped to make the change in standing by raising their percentage with a pair of wins over Boston. The first game was a shutout, 5 to 0 and the second an 8 to 2 victory.

WILLS SAILS TO EUROPE FOR REST

NEW YORK, July 8.—(United News)—Harry Wills, the negro heavyweight, has sailed away for Europe amid nearly as much acclaim as that received by Jack Dempsey, the man who has failed to recognize him professionally.

Wills, accompanied by his wife, boarded the Berengaria Wednesday for a six weeks' tour of the continent, during which time he plans to

take the baths in France and Germany in the hope of curing the inflammation in his right hand, which has troubled him since his match with Firpo. For a full half hour, the ambitious negro chatted with newspapermen, while hundreds of passengers crowded about.

He will just rest while abroad, and does not intend to "put on a glove" while in Europe. Asked if there was any significance to the fact that he was heading for Europe just at the time Dempsey was returning, Wills said "don't kid me."

Jack Kearns was at the pier to see the Berengaria sail, but did not join in the ovation to Wills. He declared again that he was still Jack Dempsey's "partner."

"Iron Man" McGinnity Out Of Baseball After 30 Years In Pro. Ball

DUBUQUE, Ia., July 8.—Joe "Iron Man" McGinnity, famous pioneer major league pitcher, today terminated more than 30 years on the diamond when he resigned as manager of the Dubuque club of the Mississippi Valley league.

McGinnity, who has passed his 54th year, sold his interests in the club to Joan Armstrong. He said differences with his partners over management and training methods were responsible for his retirement.

The "Iron man" will return to his home at Moline, Ill.

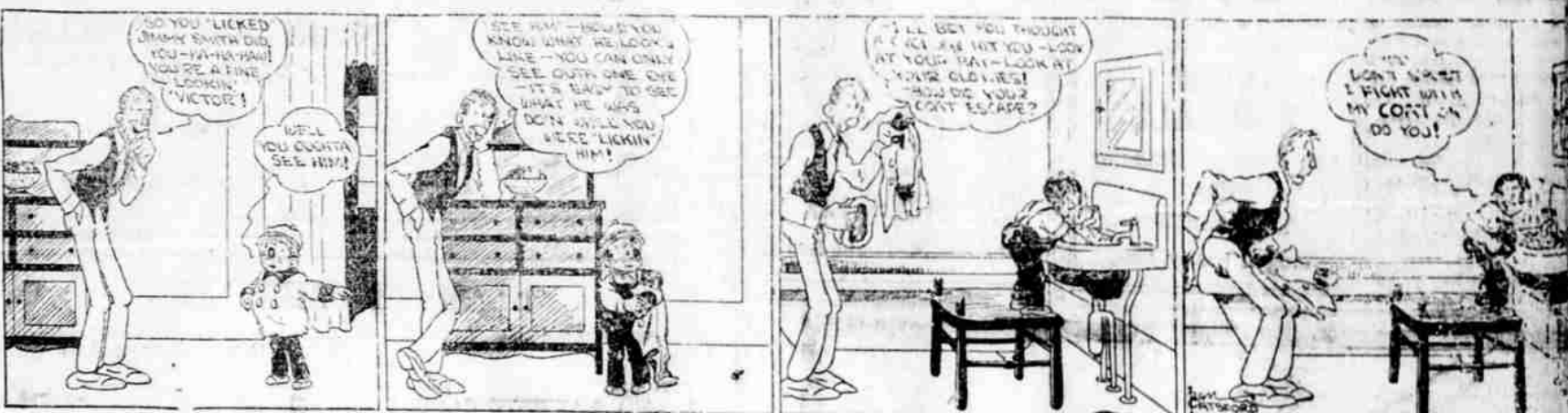

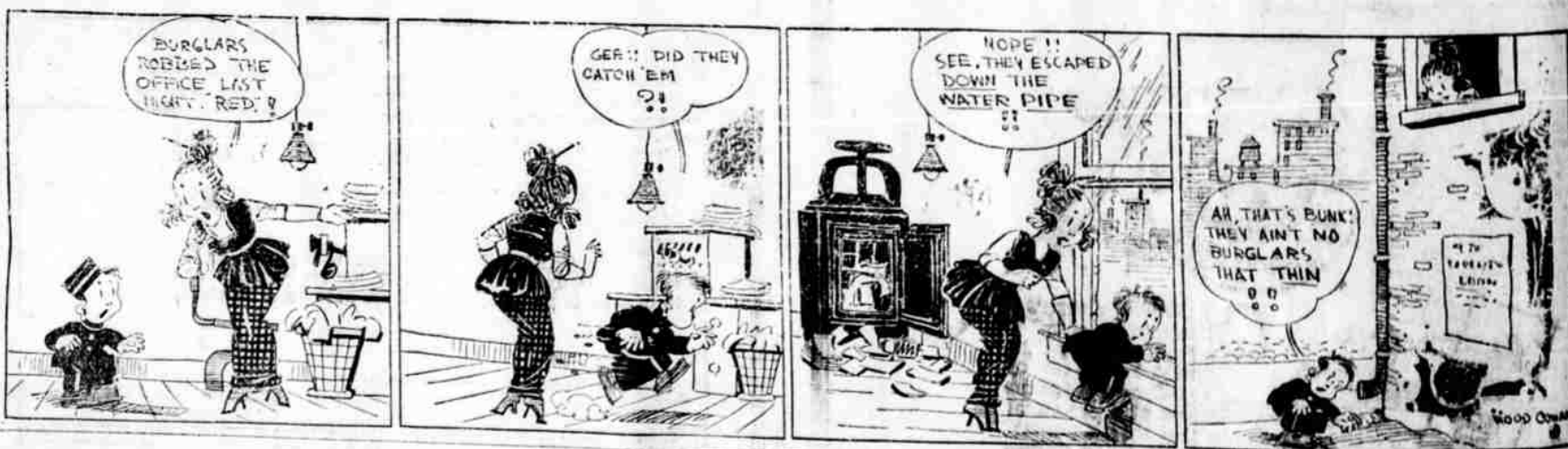
