

K. F. PUBLICITY ON S. P. MENUS ON TRAINS OVER ENTIRE RAIL SYSTEM

Further widespread publicity for Klamath Falls is offered by the latest illustrated menu to be used on Southern Pacific dining cars everywhere.

The menu folder carries on the front cover an interesting picture of Klamath lake, with the following caption:

"Southern Pacific's Natron line from Oakridge to Kirk in Oregon, now being built, and which it is expected will be in operation next summer, will open to the world some of the loveliest country in western America."

"Bridging the gap between Oakridge and Kirk will give the traveler an alternative main line route between San Francisco and Portland."

It traverses magnificent mountain scenery and either skirts or brings within easy access such beautiful bodies of water as Odell lake, Crescent lake, Diamond lake, Crater lake and the Klamath lakes.

"The illustration shows the line, just outside Klamath Falls, along the shore of lower Klamath lake, which it follows for more than thirty miles."

"The logs show at the right of the railroad track indicates the lumber operations so important in this territory, and of which Klamath Falls is the center."

During the next month 60,000 copies of this menu will be used on Southern Pacific trains from Portland to New Orleans, and from San Francisco to Ogden.

FRANKIE MURPHY GETS NO HEARING

Local Fans Disappointed At Commission's Attitude

Boxing supporters of this city were disappointed last night, when they learned through the local boxing commission that Frankie Murphy had been barred from appearing in any boxing bouts under the jurisdiction of the governing body.

Murphy made a tremendous hit last Saturday by the wonderful battle he put up against tremendous odds, and his many new-made supporters were anxious to see him box again in the local arena.

"I have not been officially notified of my suspension and think that if I were given a chance to go thoroughly into the matter with the commission that perhaps a different light could be thrown on the matter. If it is true that I am suspended, I have no complaint to make. I will take my medicine, but I feel that it is no more than right that I should be given a hearing. I am sorry to disappoint my friends who were all set for a return match between myself and Ritchie."

JURY SELECTED IN SCOPES TRIAL

DAYTON, Tenn., July 10.—Making faster headway than either side had anticipated, defense and prosecution in the Scopes evolution trial finished selection of the jury on the first day's trial, and then adjourned until Monday, when the hearing of the case will begin.

The twelve good men and true, who will weigh the evidence concerning the charge that John T. Scopes, taught in violation of the state anti-evolution law, includes six Baptists, three Methodists, one member of the Church of Christ, one with no church and one whose affiliation was not brought out in the questioning. All are farmers, save one, a shipping clerk, although one of the farmers previously taught school and another was a United States marshal under the Wilson administration.

The baby member is W. F. Robertson, age 30, who has no church connection. The oldest member is Captain J. R. Thompson, a pleasant gentleman of the old school, with snow white hair and goatee. He was a former United States marshal, and said he was a Methodist, "but not a very good one."

Robertson appeared at the railing when his name was called and stood, cap in hand, before the bench. He said he was a tenant farmer, was satisfied he could hear all sides and weigh the evidence fairly, and was accepted without a quibble by either side.

WILL NOT RESIGN

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 10.—Reports that Secretary of the Treasury Mellon contemplated resigning, said to have been circulated in New York, were denied at the summer white house today.

The president was said to be confident Mellon had no intention of giving up his present post in the cabinet.

SLIGHT QUAKE IS FELT IN MONTANA

BUTTE, Mont., July 10.—(United News)—An echo of the severe earthquakes in the Big Belt mountain region of Montana two weeks ago occurred Friday, when a sharp tremor was felt apparently centering in the Gallatin valley.

Billings, Butte, Great Falls and Helena felt the shock, but not so severely as Three Forks, Manhattan and Lombard, in the center of the quake district. It came at about 7:45 a. m., mountain time Friday. No damage of consequence was done, however. A few bricks from chimneys shattered by the former quakes toppled down, while dishes and windows rattled.

Geologists say Friday's tremors were "after quakes" which often follow a severe shock, but that they would not reach serious proportions.
