Coast League Will Send Several Into Big Leagues Soon

Yankee Scout Has His Eyes On Hunnefield of Beavers; Shea, McCann, Warner, Paul Waner and Others

PORTLAND, July 10.—(United News)—Billy Hunnefield, Portland Beavers' centerfielder, will be bought by the New York Yankees at the end of the 1925 season, if not before, was the information hinted by Ed Holley, scout for the Yankees, who watched Hunnefield play several games here early this week. Hunnefield has played great ball with Portland this year. His fielding is sensational and his batting, while it has slumped within the past few weeks, still remains above the .300 mark.

The Yankee scout is also interested in young Mervin Shea, catcher for the Sacramento club. The youngster has a wonderful throwing arm, and is a hard working catcher.

There are several other young players in the Coast league this season who likely will be sold to the big time before many weeks roll by. The Pittsburgh Pirates are on the trail of Paul Waner, slugging Seal, while the Detroit Tigers will get Jack Warner, third baseman of the Vernon club.

Portland likely will lose the services of Emmitt McCann this fall, and it would not be surprising if he were sent to the Philadelphia Nationals, although Brooklyn has been more or less interested in him. McCann is playing brilliant ball this year. He is hitting well and his fielding is sensational.

This spring McCann played in over 20 games straight without making an error.

SID TERRIS TOO MUCH FOR 'ACE'

CHICAGO, July 10.—(U. N.)—Sid Terris eliminated one of the many contenders for the lightweight crown here tonight, when he outpointed "Ace" Hudkins in all but three rounds of their ten-round bout.

Hudkins, considered the best western representative of the lightweight scramble, was helpless before the scientific fighting of Terris. He was given the third and ninth rounds only because his wild swings happened to land.

During all of the rounds of the fight, with the exception of the first, Terris pounded Hudkins' body almost at will. The first round was a draw, Hudkins managing to land one of his swings.

Hudkins weighed 136½ pounds, and Terris 132 pounds.
