PELICANS PEPPED UP FOR CLASH WITH DUNSMUIR THIS AFTERNOON

Problematical Whether Street or Mohler Will Start Game; Hull May Twirl For Dunsmuir; McNeely Gives Pelicans A Gob's Farewell

With weather predictions most favorable, a howling crowd of several thousand is expected to fill the fair grounds grandstand this afternoon to see the Pelicans get off to what they hope will be a flying start on the second half of the Klamath-Siskiyou league season.

Manager Glover is as yet undecided as to who he will start in the box. Street is available, and raring for a chance to pitch a game in his home county. Street has had hard luck this season, being ill during the early part. He pitched a good Fourth of July game at Roseburg, and appeared to be back in condition.

"Sunny" Mohler will warm up with Street, and the batteries will not be announced until just before the game. Street has a mighty fast curve ball. He is a right hander. His only disadvantage is that he has not worked out with the Pelicans but several times early in the season.

The Pelicans lost a flashy second baseman before they realized they had him even. McNeely, who played a whole of a game against Grants Pass last Sunday, has migrated to Saskatoon, giving the Pelicans a "gob's farewell." Watts will cover second and Norwest short, or vice versa.

The Pelicans need this game more than ever. Weed and Mt. Shasta are playing a double header, and as the Weeds are predicted to take both ends, a loss by Klamath Falls would shove them out of the first division.

DEPAOLO DASHES HOME WINNER IN 250 MILE DERBY

WASHINGTON, SPEEDWAY, LAUREL, Md., July 11.—(United Press)—Peter De Paolo was awarded first place in the 250-mile auto race at Laurel, Md., tonight after officials had made a re-check of the official figures.

Robert McDonough, who was thought to have won the grind, was given second place.

Shortly after the race was completed this afternoon De Paolo, when told that he was second, entered a protest and asked for a re-check. His request was granted. After several hours of figuring at a hotel here, officials announced that the young Italian had led the field home.

Driving at a terrific pace, sometimes reaching 131 miles an hour, McDonough fought off Peter De Paolo, the favorite, driving a Duesenberg. For the last fifty miles these two lapped all the other entrants and fought out the race between themselves.

McDonough was the youngest driver of the 15 starters, most of whom were veterans of years experience. He has been a protégé of Tommy Milton.

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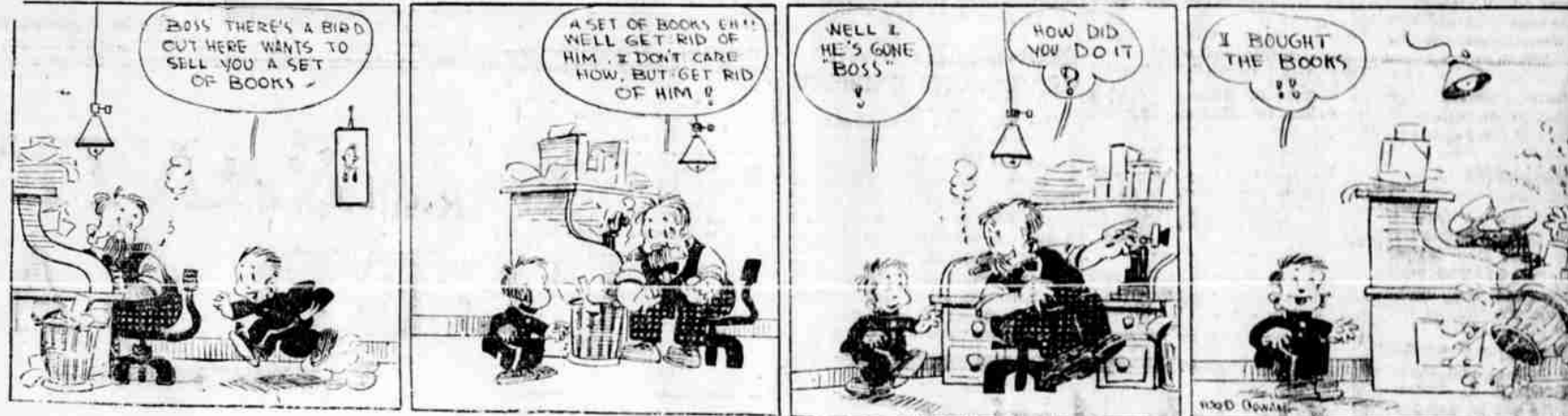
