From Montague—Mr. and Mrs. I. S. Davis were Klamath Falls visitors yesterday from Montague.

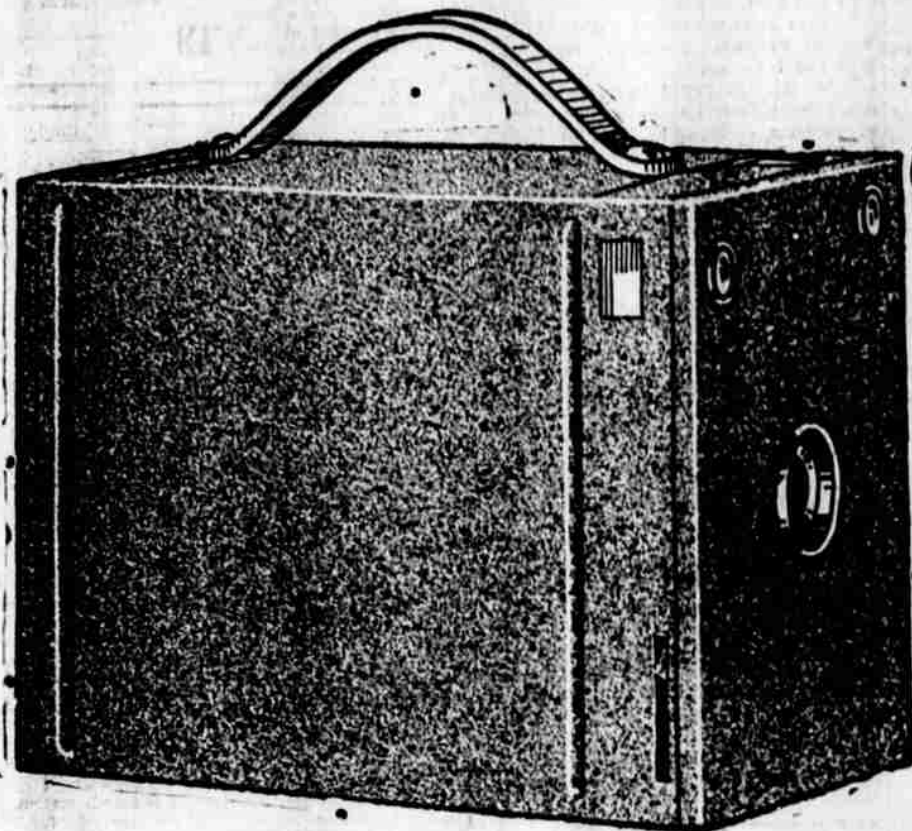
Viola Dana in Real Romance
