Industries of Ore. Show Marked Gains

WASHINGTON, July 11.—Re- markable progress in manufacturing in Oregon is indicated by figures of the census of manufacturers of the United States census bureau for 1923, made public today.

The total value of products was found to be almost \$364,000,000, an increase of 62.7 per cent over the census of 1921, when the products were valued at approximately \$233,500,000. The census of manufactur- ers is taken every two years.

The manufacturing gain for the United States as a whole by the census of 1923 is only 41.1 per cent.

Oregon makes a like showing of high rate of gain in the number of wage earners employed, which reach- ed over 62,000, an increase of 56 per cent, with wage payments amounting to more than \$81,000,000, an increase of 65 1/2 per cent.

More than half the wage earners are employed in lumber produc- tions.
